HEALTH

DIET AND DINING

Member Tacoma Memorial Institute Everywhere we hear of dieting.

A patient will say, "Yes, I have been on a diet for six months or longer, and feel no improvement in my condition." Now, on examination it is revealed that the "diet" may have been advised by a neighbor, a friend, or some other person with no knowledge of the body or its requirements. Yet the advice will be religiously followed, often with deleterious effects.

Improper eating and drinking soon heavily as causes of many forms of human disease. When we consider the wonderful variety of the different materials that go to make up the tissue of our bodies, we readily see that the world needs more advice on its eating. As life becomes more complex, new tastes, desires, and the means of supplying them exist, the human organism will often be burdened in trying to assimilate these various compounds.

In the old days of simple foods it was easy to eliminate the undesirable varieties. Nowadays the

selection of proper food values is essential before a "diet" can be recommended to anyone. The physician, with his general and technical knowledge of the human organism and its workings, is the only one scientifically equipped to supervise all dieting. Every practicing physician knows scores of cases in which un supervised dieting did a vast amount of harm. The practice of self dieting is just as bad as self medication.

Starvation is not dieting in the proper sense of the term, neither is vegetarianism, omitting sugar, leaving off meats, etc., but a proper "tipping of the balance," so to speak, of the intake. More starch foods and less meats, or more meats and less starch, but always with a fair amount of fresh vegetables, will come nearer to striking an average than any other rule for routine feeding.

Most large hospitals have dietitians whose duty it is, under the supervision of the physician in charge of the patient, to work out the balance of diet for each individual. Remarkable results are obtained in many chronic diseases with this as the only line of treatment. Each individual has his own particular set of digestive organs and has been living his own particular life, thus no set rule is likely to meet his particular requirements. The diet must be adapted to the patient, and not the patient to the diet.

Much harm has been done and is being done by improper dieting. Food, to sustain life, must furnish to the body enough nourishment to keep up its heat, repairs, and normal activity, without doing bodily damage, such as occurs with over-indulgence of food. The physician, because he is able to determine body requirements and knows the condition of the vital organs, should be consulted on all questions of diet.

"Music Master" Coming To Arcade Friday

Nothing could show the versatility of Alan Dwan more effectively than his ability to go from the modern jazz tempo of his former productions to the subtle and stately melody of "The Music Master," which he recently adapted to the screen for Fox from the famous old stage play.

The story is laid in the New York of 1890, and is chiefly concerned with Aaron Van Horwicz, a Jewish old musician who gave up a brilliant career in Vienna to come to America in search of his wife who ran away with a man who had been his friend, and taken with her his only daughter.

There is infinite address in the theme, and Alan Francis in the role of the lonely old man has done a beautiful piece of work. Louis Moran, as the daughter, is lovely perfectly cast, and Neil Hamilton, Norman Trevor, Charles Lane and Kathleen Corrigan provide excellent support.

The climax is reached in that fine dramatic scene made famous on the stage by David Warfield, when the real father and the foster father meet and clash with all the accumulated bitterness of the years between them.

"The Music Master" will be the attraction at the Arcade theater Friday and Saturday.

"Knockout Reilly" Now Showing At The Star

One of those fast moving comedy dramas with which Richard Dix has earned for himself cinema fame, opened this afternoon at the Star theater for a three days run, when "Knockout Reilly," his latest stellar effort for Paramount had its initial showing.

The athletic ability which won him such acclamation in "The Quarterback" finds him again in good stead in this story of a young wrestler pitted against a champion fighter in a pugilistic championship after many vicissitudes.

Motivating it all are two very human passions of revenge and love, with an ample sprinkling of the delightful Dix brand of humor.

Mary Brian as the ebullient entertainer is extremely easy to look at. Fringine Bunn, from the very first, when Dix arrives on a Saturday night at the cabaret looking for recreation. He finds plenty when Kipper Agnew (Jack Benault) who has just defeated Pat Malone, Mary's pugilist brother, makes welcome advances to her. The smitten Reilly knocks him out without knowing who he is. This chaotic jumble starts him on his mad career, when Malone hears of it, he advises Reilly to adopt the ring as his vocation.

"Knockout Reilly" may well be classed as the best thing Dix has done in pictures to date. Adapted from the story "The Bunch" by Albert Payson Terhune, it is engrossing in all its aspects and well handled down to the last small detail.

PARIS, May 24. (AP)—Captain Charles A. Lindbergh was paraded before the eyes of the people of Paris today to such cheers as no man had heard in this city since Woodrow Wilson made his triumphant entry into the French capital in 1918.

It was the first opportunity that the citizens of Paris, generally known to have been the most ardent admirers of the American aviator since his arrival on the Le Touraine flying field Saturday night, for of his towering hours have been devoted to receiving honors from persons in high places.

Klamath To Vote On \$500,000 Bonds

KLAMATH, ORE., May 25. (AP)—Klamath voters, at a special election June 28, will decide whether or not a half million dollars shall be expended to complete the French line county road reconstruction program.

This measure, known late yesterday when County Judge F. R. Goddard announced that the proposed half million dollar road bond issue would be placed on the ballot. It ratified the bond issue will simply funds for the improvement of 22 county roads and will mean that the county road system will be completed within a short time.
