

Churches Using More Paid Ads In Newspapers

LAN FRANCISCO, May 27 (AP).—Increasing use of paid advertising in newspapers on the part of Presbyterian churches throughout the country was reported this morning to the Presbyterian general assembly by Dr. Lewis S. Moore, moderator of the assembly, in his report on the annual report of the publicity department.

"Ministers who wisely use display ads in newspapers," said the report, "find that advertising is an investment that yields results. By prudent advertising, religion extends its field and multiplies its usefulness to the community. Its helpfulness to mankind, therefore, is a great

auxiliary to the pulpit, a powerful medium for the gospel. Advertising has persuaded millions into smoking, motoring, golfing, stock market and motion picture habits. Wise in its generation will be the united church which through advertising fully persuades the people to devote more thought, time, talent, to the Christian religion."

"The department reported that it continued to find editors 'sympathetic toward the purpose of the church, and just as willing to print religious news as to print any other class of news, provided always that it is of genuine and general interest. The newspaper editors are particularly keen for news of the church as related to current events, as, for example, in connection with recent disturbances in China."

WOMAN ANALYZES TROUBLES OF INDIA

NEW YORK—Physical and not political causes are at the base of the woes of India and the Indian people, according to Katharine Mayo, who in her book, "Mother India," published today, says:

"The whole pyramid of the Indian's woes, material and spiritual, rests upon a rock-bottom physical base. This base is sloping, his manner of setting into the world, and his sex-life therefore warped."

"Mother India" does not deal with the political situation, but attempts a comprehensive study of social and sanitary conditions of that country. Miss Mayo visited hospitals and prisons; talked with princes and politicians, as well as religious leaders, missionaries and British administrators. The author says the western world would be shocked by the revelations of the religious and social customs in India which destroy the health of its women and children.
