MAIRFIELD, Ore., May 27.—R. H. Morgan, ranchman, who was the last of the five shot in the hotel last night when he shot himself after he is alleged to have wounded Mrs. Harry Hill, of Irion, with a pistol shot. Mrs. Hill was hit by a bullet in the back of the head and her condition was reported serious. Morgan's condition was so serious that the county coroner was holding his effects in anticipation of his death.

According to police, Morgan invited Mrs. Hill to his hotel room to discuss purchase of a restaurant, and made advances which she refused. The shooting was alleged to have followed.

Must Do Time Or Undergo Operation
MICHIGAN, May 27. (AP)—Joe Collins, 45, a lumber worker, found guilty yesterday by a jury in the federal court on a statutory charge, was sentenced to serve ten years in state prison this morning by Judge C. M. Thomas with the condition that he would be paroled if he accepted the suggestion of the prosecution that he submit to a surgical operation, under the law.

The jury that found Collins guilty recommended leniency, also that the chief witness against him, a junior high school boy of 15 years, be placed under some restriction. No action along the latter line has been taken as yet.

Collins has not decided which alternative he will accept.

Survey Log Road In Central Oregon
PORTLAND, May 27. (AP)—R. A. Booth, vice president of the South-Kelly Lumber company, who is interested in the Ochoco Timber company, was quoted here today as saying that surveys being made east of Prineville were for the purpose of completing an old survey for a railroad into timber holdings of the Ochoco company in Crook county.

The survey was undertaken last fall by the company in order to determine the details and cost of such a road, which they anticipate building at some future date.

100 Men Reported Entombed in Mine
TRINIDAD, Colo., May 27. (AP)—The U. S. bureau of mines rescues has been dispatched from Trinidad to Delago, Colo., where 100 men are reported to have been at work in the Victor-American Fuel company mine Number 2, when an explosion occurred this afternoon.

The Colorado Fuel and Iron company rescue car also has been sent to Trinidad. Neither the U. S. bureau of mines nor the state department of mines has received word of any one being killed.

Weyerhaeuser Will Complete Its Mill
TACOMA, May 27. (AP)—At the annual meeting of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, held here yesterday, it was announced that definite decision had been reached to push forward to completion the company's new mill at Longview. The mill is planned to cut one million feet of lumber in a year.

It will be a year before the new mill will be ready to operate. A report on the company's reforestation work showed that in the past year 50,000 acres of cut-over land have been added to the timber under development for future timber crops.
