The Garden

Summer squashes are a good experiment if you have never tried them. Put in some of the new bush varieties that won't take up too much room. There is no hurry and plenty of time to buy seed. Fine planting does very well for them.

Divide dahlia tubers preparatory to planting them. Put out those with the longest sprouts first and hold back those just starting into growth.

There are other varieties of corn besides Golden Bantam worth planting for later crops although Golden Bantam is enough to satisfy anybody.

Get in seed of perennials early this year. It is best to wait until late in June or July. The earlier they are started the better the plants next year.

Keep dahlia tubers between moist blotters for three days before planting them. They are of uncertain germination and this helps greatly.

It is time for second plantings of carrots and for some more peas.
