persons have lost their lives thus far in the Mississippi flood, the American Red Cross reported today.

The report, made by Henry M. Baker, director of disaster relief, to James L. Pleser, vice chairman of the organization in charge of operations, and Secretary Hoover, included no reports or rumors of deaths, but only those verified by the organization.

The largest number of flood deaths occurred in Arkansas, where 25 died. Mississippi came next with 42, Louisiana nine, Illinois, two; Tennessee, two. None was reported in Kentucky and Missouri. The report said some of the dead had not been identified.

AQUEDUCT AGAIN HURT BY BLAST

Second Explosion in Los Angeles Water Carrier Reported Today

LOS ANGELES, May 28 (AP)—Los Angeles city officials announced today their intention of appealing to Gov. C. C. Young for state militia to protect the city's aqueduct which runs through Owens Valley, 200 miles north of here, where two sections of the long water course, which supplies the metropolitan area have been dynamited in the last 24 hours.

The report of second blasting, received here this morning, said about 100 feet of piping had been dynamited. Repair crew was reported dispatched to the scene near Big Pine.

The piping carried water to a power house near Big Pine in the Owens valley, about 250 miles north of Los Angeles and 140 miles above the scene of yesterday's explosion which tore off approximately 425 feet of steel piping in No. Nine canyon in Inyo county.

Telephone lines connecting Owens valley with Los Angeles and interstate bus to Nevada were reported out of order.

SACRAMENTO, May 28 (AP)—Gov. C. C. Young will give serious consideration to any plea from Los Angeles for national guard troops to protect its water supply from continued dynamite attacks in Owens valley. No such request has been received at the governor's office as yet. It was announced the facts must be fully presented for study before the executive will either grant or deny such a plea, if made.
