News of the Churches

Memorial Day To Be Observed In Local Churches

La Grande Houses of Worship Will Remember Those Who Died in Service Tomorrow.

Memorial Day, set aside in memory of those who fought and died for their country, will be observed in most of the churches of the city Sunday morning. Larger crowds than usual are expected to gather at the various churches to pay tribute to those who have already passed to the Great Beyond.

"The men whose graves shall be decorated on Memorial Day were men who sacrificed their lives and in institutions of justice, lost them for the sake of great ideas and principles, and for their lives counted it honor to deny themselves and endure for all things even death itself," declares the Rev. J. George Wallis, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, in paying tribute to those who have sacrificed by attending the memorial services on Sunday.

First Presbyterian Church—All interested men are especially invited to attend the memorial services at the First Presbyterian church during the regular morning hour of worship, beginning at 11 o'clock. The pastor will speak on "Undeclared to Achievement."

The pastor will present two appropriate tributes for the occasion, "Sons of Men" by Charles Wallis, and "When Walls are Rising" by Walter House Jones.

At eight o'clock in the evening the pastor will bring a message on "The Atonement." There will be special music at this service also.

Bible school meets at 10 o'clock in the morning and Christian Endeavor at four and 8:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Lutheran Church—Memorial Day services will also be held at the Swedish Lutheran church Sunday morning, beginning at 11 o'clock. The pastor, the Rev. Carl H. Aasen, will bring the sermon. The subject will be "The Message of Memorial Day."

The church school will meet at 10 o'clock. Mr. Aasen will again take charge of the adult class which meets in the church auditorium.

Island City Church—A Memorial Day program has also been announced by the Rev. Hall R. Wallis, pastor of the Island City community church, for the morning hour of worship, beginning at 11 o'clock. Sunday school will begin at 10 o'clock and

the young people's meeting will be held at seven o'clock in the evening. Mrs. Edward Breckland will be the leader for this meeting.

Episcopal Church—"That Body That Shall Not" will be the subject of the sermon at St. Peter's Episcopal church during the 11 o'clock worship hour, which will also be a Memorial Day service. In addition to the sermon there will be special music in commemoration. There will be Holy Eucharist at eight o'clock in the morning and church school at 9:45.

Nazarene Church—The Sunday school of the Church of the Nazarene will give a missionary program Sunday evening at eight o'clock at the church. The pastor will bring the message during the 11 o'clock worship hour, which will be at 11 o'clock. Sunday school starts at 9:45 in the morning and the Nazarene Young People's League meets at 7:15. Mrs. Fred Kelly will be in charge.

First M. E. Church—"Making the World Christian" will be the subject of the Rev. H. W. Parker, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, during the morning service. There will also be special music. Sunday school will begin at 9:45 o'clock and the evening church services at eight.

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Enforcement Of Prohibition Is Urged In Report

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28 (AP)—Prohibition enforcement, as a duty of all Christian Americans is emphasized in the annual report of the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education to be presented to the Presbyterian General Assembly here Monday morning.

The board laments the death of Dr. Charles Scanlon of Pittsburgh, "for 25 years its temperance crusader," but declares that the church at large "must show its appreciation of his life work by continuing his campaign and being faithful to his ideals." Dr. J. W. Claude of Pittsburgh is announced as acting director in Dr. Scanlon's place.

"During the last year," says the board in its report, "vast strides have been made in the enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. In spite of renewed activities of the enemies of prohibition, it is more firmly entrenched today than ever before. There can be no doubt that the economic, social, moral and religious benefits that have resulted from prohibition are so significant that they will never be overruled by wet propaganda."

"If prohibition has been charged with failure it is due largely to the fact that prohibition as written has never been tried. The courts are showing constantly a more vigorous enforcement of the law. District attorneys are on every hand reorganizing their responsibility. The liquor traffic has gone and as a commercialized vice has disappeared permanently. If it exists here and there, it is due to the laxity of those charged with the responsibility of law enforcement. The liquor traffic is more indefensible today than ever. It is more hopelessly outlawed. With the rising tide of intelligent youth there is no doubt that the safety of prohibition is assured."

The board recommends: "Enforcing the eighteenth amendment through competent and worthy servants of the law."

"Supporting those interested with the enforcement of the act by Christian citizens."

"Making punishment swift, sure and certain."

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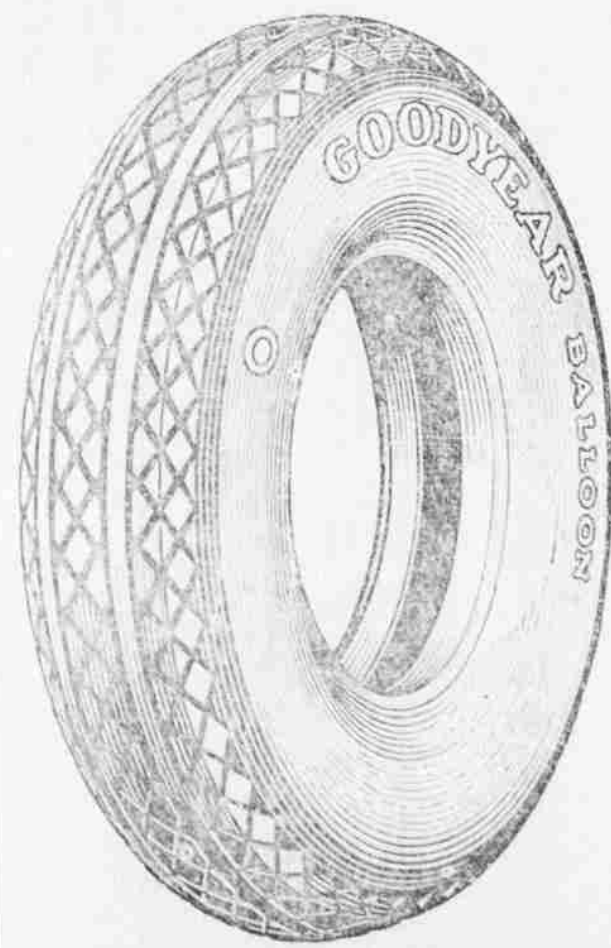
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
