PRESBYTERIANS CLOSE ASSEMBLY

Thunderous Affirmation of Religious Faith Ends Session

LAN FRANCISCO, June 2 (AP)—With checks totalling \$185,000 in their pockets for mileage and expenses, laymen and ministers who comprise the 125th general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A., today were preparing to return to their homes. The checks were passed out yesterday as one of the last matters of business before adjournment.

The closing sessions found the delegates gripped by deep emotional fervor and the assembly ended with a thunderous affirmation of religious faith. Moderator Robert E. Speer, by a plea for harmony, averted a last-minute clash almost precipitated when fundamentalists made a final effort to upset the report of the permanent judicial commission confirming the ordination of the two New York ministers who admitted doubts as to the Virgin birth and miracles.

When the fundamentalist speakers showed a disposition to argue that the commission's report must in no way be interpreted as a weakening of faith, Moderator Speer led off with the apostle's creed, and delegates and hundreds of visitors repeated the words with him in a sudden burst of enthusiasm. Later the assembly unanimously approved the minutes of yesterday's meeting, thus ending the controversy.

Idaho Official Facing Liquor Trial in Boise

BOISE, Ida., June 2 (AP)—David Barrett, Idaho commissioner of public welfare, arrested yesterday on a charge of unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor, will appear before U. W. Adams, justice of the peace, tomorrow for preliminary hearing. Charles Hatfield, Boise superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of Idaho, was the complaining witness.

Governor H. C. Burdette, charged the matter was "evidently one for the courts" and that he would "make no decision until I have all the facts," when asked if he would issue official condemnations of the charge. Commissioner Barrett's bond, of \$500, was furnished by Cecil Corbin and Donald S. Whitcomb, both of Boise.

In amplifying the complaint, charging Mr. Barrett with possession of liquor, the night of December 4, 1926, Mr. Hatfield declared that he had seen a bottle of whisky in the possession of Barrett. He said no action has been taken by the United States district attorney's office.
