

CHERRY GROWERS WARNED OF FLIES

Light Crop Should Bring
Good Prices During
Season Is Belief

WALLA WALLA, June 3.—The 1927 crop of cherries in Washington will be very light due to the severe freeze in late April. This shortage should insure a very good market for cherries from the two districts which escaped the frost injury. Any further loss would be doubly serious.

The cherry fruit fly is one of the very serious enemies of cherries to the cherry growers of Washington. It is established in Walla Walla county, Western Washington, and has been reported from the Yakima valley. The damage is spreading each year to new territory. This pest is particularly serious for the infesting of even a small percentage of the cherries in an orchard causes the rest to be unsalable, since the maggot of the fly cannot be detected in the fruit without opening it. The cherry appears nearly normal until the maggot is ready to emerge.

Finally Controlled

The insect is easily controlled if the proper measures are taken at the right time.

It is first necessary to recognize the insect and a few words on its life history may be valuable. The adult insect is a fly which emerges from the soil around the tree about the time the cherries begin to color well. It is a little smaller than the house fly and has brown, veined eyes and legs with a dark brown or black body. It is important that the cherry grower be able to recognize the fly for the spraying should not be done until the fly is observed on or about the trees, and should then be done quickly. A very distinguishing mark on this insect is the distinct black bands which cross the wings.

10 Days To Eggs

These flies begin laying eggs about ten days after they appear. The egg is deposited in the cherry and the young maggot hatches in the fruit in from 3 to 5 days. About 14 days are required for the maggot to develop to maturity during which it burrows about in the fruit spending most of its time near the pit. Until the maggot is nearly full grown the cherry frequently shows no evidence of injury from the outside. When full grown the maggot crawls out of the fruit and drops to the ground where it remains buried to a shallow depth until the next spring when it emerges as a fly.

Co-Op Institute Plans To Study Farm Problems

How far agriculture is capable of dealing with the surplus production problem, through its own business organizations is to be discussed at the summer session of the American Institute of Cooperation, which will be held in Chicago, June 26 to July 30.

William M. Jordine, secretary of agriculture, and Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, will keep in touch with the work of the institute.

Opinion in agricultural circles is divided on the farm surplus question. There are groups which

view cooperative organization as the best means of adjusting supply and demand. Critics believe the movement cannot be developed sufficiently to offset the effect over-producing has on prices.

Speakers and lecturers are expected to analyze the powers and limitations of cooperative enterprises. They are to discuss how far cooperative associations should go in an attempt to stabilize prices, and what influence they eventually may have in regulating volume of production.

Lively debate is expected between advocates of monopoly methods for influencing prices and those who insist cooperative enterprise chiefly should emphasize service to both producer and consumer through increased efficiency and elimination of waste in production and distribution.

During the first week of the institute, courses will be given on cooperative marketing of grain, cotton and tobacco; in the second week, on livestock and wool; the third, dairy cooperation; and in the fourth, cooperative handling of perishable fruits, vegetables and poultry products.

The sessions will be held in Winchell Hall, Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill. Attendance is expected to approximate 100 persons.

BEWARE OF SCRATCHES—MAY CAUSE SERIOUS TROUBLE

Scratches—consciously, unconsciously, and accidentally incurred—are so universal that they are given slight consideration. This negligence has caused diseases, much suffering, and the loss of limb and life.

The skin has a number of layers. The outer layer protects the delicate tissues against germ infection. When this outer layer is injured by a scratch, tear, or puncture, you are exposed to the danger of serious infection. A more serious scratch, inflicted by an external object on the hand or any part of the body, thoughtlessly ignored, is the cause of what is commonly known as blood poisoning.

The most dangerous weapon of self infection is the finger nail. The finger picks up and carries all germs of bacteria under its nail. Scratching the ear with the finger, almost an unconscious act, is frequently followed by a foul or septic, and in time various degrees of deafness may result. The external auditory canal furnishes moisture and heat, an excellent culture media for germ growth.

Nose picking or putting out the small hair in the nostril may be the cause of erysipelas infections of the nose and sinuses.

Scratching the back of the neck either with finger nails or rough clothing is a common cause of boils or carbuncles. The infection gains entrance through a scratch or hair follicle.

There are potentially two million diseases in the United States. If one of these should infect the neck by scratching, the life of the individual would be endangered.

A scratch inflicted by pulling the eye, owing to the delicate tissue and richly supplied blood vessels there, may be the cause of pink eye, styra, and other interferences. An abscess should be consulted in the event of even a slight abrasion.

Great abscesses and fistula frequently follow a scratch.

Chronic skin diseases may be traced to the habit of scratching.

The germ of syphilis can infect the victim of a scratch.

If the skin is scratchy and itches, consult a physician. It may avoid needless distress or suffering.

Treatment of poison or an alcoholic solution of some other good antiseptic should be applied immediately to a scratch or abrasion occurring on any part of the body.

Many, seed cultivation is dangerous to growing tomatoes. The seed must be kept free from weeds, especially horse noxious (nightshade), a relative of the tomato common in some sections and which spreads certain diseases. Since the tomato is not deep rooted, shallow cultivation is best. Do not cultivate the vines when wet, as this may spread the spores of bud-blight. Cultivate until vines cover the ground, but discontinue when it injures the plants. Thereafter weed with a hoe.
