Breakfast—Sliced fresh pine- apple, cereal, cream, broiled fresh fish, whole wheat popovers, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Savory macaroni, rye bread, radishes and onions, fresh sweet cherries, bran cook- ies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked fish, new po- tatoes in parsley butter, cucumber and water cream salad, prune pud- ding, milk, coffee.

Savory Macaroni Two cups cooked macaroni, 2 cups cooked kidney beans, 2 cups tomato puree, 2 onions, 1 table- spoon minced parsley, 6 slices ba- con, 2 whole cloves, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Cut each slice of bacon in four pieces. Cook until crisp and very slightly browned. Skim out of fat and keep hot. Peel and mince onions. Cook in bacon fat until a pale straw color. Add tomato puree, parsley, cloves and pepper. Bring to the boiling point and sim- mer ten minutes. Put beans,

which have been reheated, in the center of a hot serving dish or platter. Surround with a border of hot macaroni and pour the sauce over the whole. Serve with a bowl of grated cheese. (Copy- right, 1927, NEA Service, Inc.)
