In the first game Alexander demonstrated the champions' own pitching strength by granting only eight hits for an 8 to 0 shutout. But in the second game, Duak of the Robins allowed five safeties in a 6 to 1 victory.

In a 7 to 0 white-washing administered by the Chicago Cubs to the Boston Braves, Baker allowed five hits and Zachary of the St. Louis Browns pitched a six-hit game for his team's third straight over the Senators 9 to 1.

Stanford Wins Coast Classic; Trojans Second

LOS ANGELES, June 6—Stanford University won the Pacific Coast intercollegiate track and field meet at the Coliseum here Saturday afternoon with a score of 55 1/2 points. Three coast conference records were shattered.

The University of Southern California was second with 48 points after a strenuous battle with a score of 52 1/2.

Washington was third with 50 points.

California and Oregon Agricultural colleges tied for fourth place with 28 points. Other scores were: Oregon 16, Idaho 8, Washington State 7, Montana 4, California Tech 4.

Leo Barnes, University of Southern California, shattered the Pacific coast conference record for the pole vault when he cleared the bar at 12 feet, 8 1/2 inches.

After winning the 100-yard dash in 9.9 seconds, Charlie Borah, who of U. S. C., broke the coast conference record for the 220-yard dash when he negotiated the distance in 21 seconds flat.

Graham, the third member of the U. S. C. team to lower coast conference records, won the low hurdles in 24 seconds flat.

Huge Trout Taken Near Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 6 (AP)—A new angling record was established in Klamath yesterday when Ed Gordon, Portland, hooked and landed a mammoth rainbow trout, 36 1/2 inches long, in Odessa creek.

The fish sets a new records for length, but not weight. It weighed 50 pounds. The record Klamath fish was taken in 1921 by Dr. Sikes, Oakland. It was 48 inches long and weighed 23 1/2 pounds.

Gordon's catch is all the more noteworthy from the fact that he used a five ounce rod and light line. He was trolling in Odessa creek which empties into upper Klamath Lake.

Idaho Boy Throws Javelin 205 Feet

CHICAGO (AP)—The flying feat of three negro boys added by a white champion, carried northeast high school of Detroit into the intercollegiate track championship of America Saturday.

The quartet, matching speed and brawn with 1000 other boys from 18 high schools in 32 states, won the meet held under the auspices of the University of Chicago on Soldiers' field, by scoring 23 points.

The squad from Ford County, Colo., winners of the 1925 and 1926 titles, finished second with 18 1/2 points.

Jimmy Demers entered as a freshman from San Rafael, Idaho, established a record of 205 feet 1 1/2 inches in the javelin throw, eclipsing the record by 7 1/2 inches Demers, on his very first effort, hurled the spear 205 feet for a new record. Then he increased his distance an inch and a quarter before his daunted competitors realized what had happened.
