

PRICES SURGING IN WALL STREET

Rails, Public Utilities in Strong Demonstrations of Strength

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Stock prices continued to surge forward today despite intermittent profit taking and bear selling. Morgan, public utilities and railroads gave the best demonstration of group strength.

"Nicket Dink," Chicago and Eastern Illinois common and preferred, Worthington Pump, Pittsburg Coal, Case Threshing Machine, Brooklyn Union Gas and Union Tank Car sold 4 or more points above Saturday's last quotations.

Among the two score highs were 80 Point preferred, General Motors, American Water Works, Commonwealth, Potomac, American International Corporation, Gabriel Snubber, Safety Glass, Matheson Alkali and Ohio Steel.

The closing was strong. Pittsburg Coal was up 1/2, Western Maryland 7 and Baldwin, Houston Oil, International Harvester, Case Threshing Machine and Wright Aeronautical 5 to 6. Total sales approximated \$2,700,000 shares.

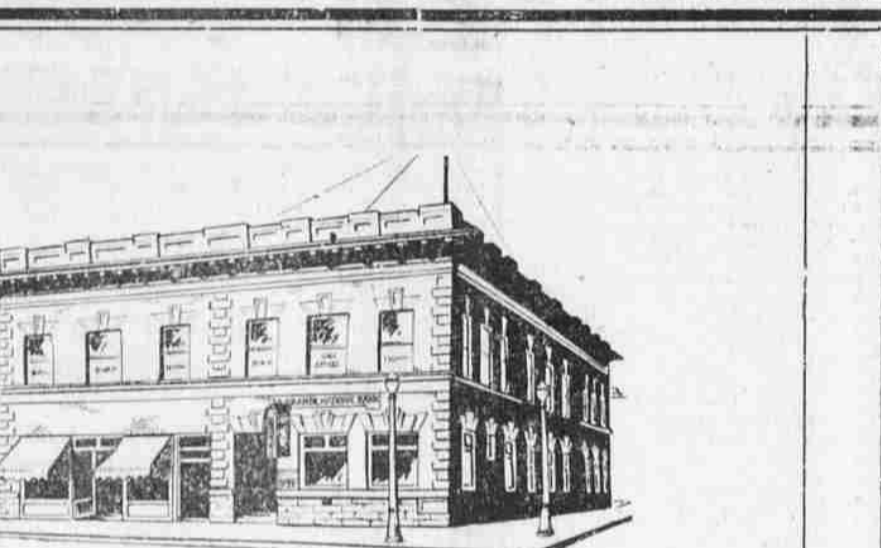
