MENUS

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Rhubarb sauce, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs with butter, cinnamon, coffee, cake, cranberry sauce. LUNCHEON—Corn loaf with tomato sauce, Boston brown bread, radishes and onions, sliced pineapple, plain cake, milk, tea. DINNER—Casseroles of mutton, liver greens, plumage and straw-berry pie, Graham rolls, currant jelly, milk, coffee.

Two cups flour, 4 tablespoons light brown sugar, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons baking powder, 1 egg, by cup milk, 1 tablespoon powdered cinnamon, 1/2 cup soft-lard, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add sugar and mix well. Rub in butter with milk and cut into first mixture adding enough more milk to make a soft dough. Spread on an oiled and floured shallow cake or pie tin. Sprinkle with cinnamon and press into dough. Bake 20 minutes in a hot oven and serve warm.

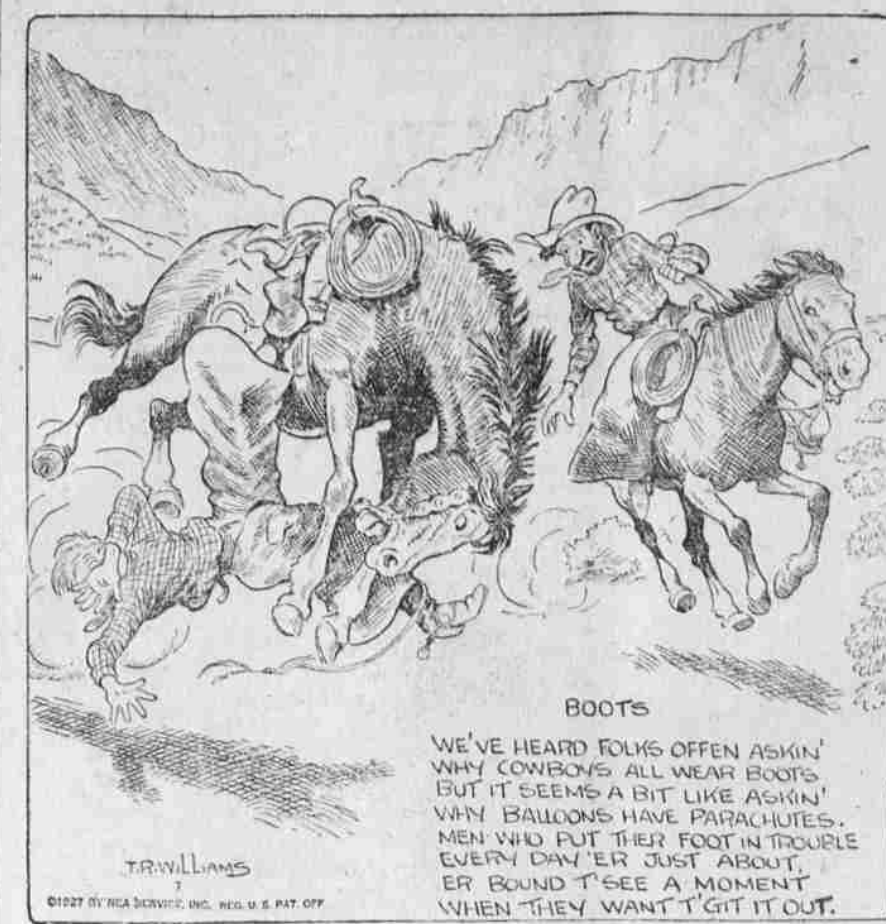

The Garden

HOME LIMAS EASY TO GROW There are many failures with home-grown lima beans, but most of them are unnecessary, and considering the fact that limas are one of the most expensive vegetables in the market, it is strange that they are not more frequently grown. It is also strange that the pole limas are not more freely grown than the dwarf sorts, because they are the best for a garden of small area, using the "side edging" of the garden instead of taking up the precious ground space. Besides a pole lima bean will give five or six times the amount of pods that a bush lima can produce.

The bush sorts are easier and less trouble to grow, but the pole sorts will repay the extra trouble of providing supports for them. It is most important in securing seed of lima beans to get them from a reliable and well-known seed house. This is particularly true of the bush sorts, for only the first class seed houses have the new and finer sorts, and job lot bush lima seed is likely to include inferior sorts as well as bush varieties.

Do not plant limas in a wet spot or when the weather bureau forecasts a cool spell. Better wait a few days and time will be saved. They need warm planting. Otherwise they may rot in the ground. Be careful to plant them edge-wise with the eye down. Ignorance of this requirement is one of the chief reasons for failure with limas. A sunny back porch may be shaded with the climbing limas, giving them strings in the same manner as the scarlet runner and the hyacinth bean are planted. It is an easy matter to keep them watered and in vigorous growth. They give ample foliage and plenty of beans to be picked off the back porch. Limas like rich soil and plenty of moisture, and thorough cultivation is the most practical means of preserving the moisture in the soil. Give bush limas plenty of room. In poor soil the small seed type do best and give larger crops.

HOW MOTHER NATURE AND VACCINATION PROTECT AGAINST DISEASE By Charles B. Lockwood, M. D., Pasadena, Cal. Member Gorgas Memorial Inst. There is much misunderstanding and some prejudice in the public mind against all forms of vaccination. This prejudice is due partly to lack of information on the part of many people regarding the true nature of vaccination and partly to the propaganda of anti-vaccinationists. It is the purpose of this article to remove the prejudice which many people hold against vaccination by explaining in a simple way the reason for vaccination and some of the reasons why practically all well trained physicians believe in it and recommend it to their patients.

Every one is endowed with a certain amount of resistance to disease. The degree of this resistance is largely a matter of heredity. There are certain diseases such as tuberculosis, cancer, and certain blood diseases which, while not directly transmitted from parent to child, are nevertheless family diseases. Children born of parents having inherited from their parents a type of tissue of body

cells with lowered resistance and they are more liable to develop these diseases. This resistance to disease is called "immunity." The immunity which we derive from our parents is called "natural immunity," and there is another kind of immunity or resistance to disease which is called "acquired immunity." This acquired immunity can be greatly stimulated by vaccination. When one catches cold or contracts any of the contagious diseases, nature immediately sets about to develop in the blood substances which are known as "anti-toxins" and these have the power of averting or greatly lessening the severity of the disease. The greater one's natural or inherited immunity, the more readily he develops this artificial or acquired immunity. Healthy animals and men can be gradually accustomed by giving repeated small doses of vaccine to resist a very large dose of disease germs, and one who has suffered from smallpox, typhoid fever, diphtheria, or almost any acute infectious disease acquired immunity or longer or shorter duration to those diseases. This same immunity can be developed artificially by means of vaccination and the development of this phase of medical science is one of the greatest triumphs of modern life. Both parents and children should be vaccinated for protection against smallpox, typhoid fever, where the water and milk supply is not absolutely safe, diphtheria, scarlet, fever, meningitis, and several less serious diseases.

Rotary Club In Convention At Ostend, Belgium

OSTEND, Belgium, June 7 (AP)—The trend in Europe today is toward higher barriers of trade, but some day the pendulum will swing and the barriers will be leveled to smooth the way for progress. T. V. Thomsen, of Aarhus, Denmark, declared today before the convention of Rotary International. "The new diplomacy," he said, "must build bridges of international understanding, tolerance and good will across the frontiers of Europe—not only to arts and sciences, but in commerce and industry. "International peace is a wonderful program, but this aim cannot be accomplished unless better economic relations are established. International industrial centers are forming. They should be encouraged, organized in the right way and in the right spirit. "In Europe, with many nations all with their special culture, language and traditions, mutual understanding and friendship are not very prevalent today. "What when Rotary grows strong, we can discharge through our members the hidden stresses of national difficulties, and then educate public opinion and finally by united effort in a spirit of friendliness and tolerance we can hope to solve our common problems. "Rotary will help bring about that moral disarmament without which no material guarantees of peace and security will prove adequate."
