Phase of History Shown in Picture Now at Star

A phase of history to the great colonizations of the west thus far neglected by motion picture is a vital part of "The Land Beyond the Law," the new First National western production starring Ken Maynard which opens at the Star theater Thursday for a three day run. While fiction and screen have shown the trials and tribulations of covered wagon caravans as being due principally to Indians, lack of water, shortage of food, no pictures thus far has shown one of the bitterest enemies of settlers in the early days, who caused most of the trouble for those desiring to establish homes in new territory.

These were the unscrupulous cattle barons, who realized that they would have to be responsible to the law and would have to raise their stock legitimately with the establishment of homes and towns in the new west. Thus "The Land Beyond the Law" shows how guidance and cattle rustlers, headed by a dishonest cattle baron, were brought in terms when the United States government took a hand.

The difficulties of the early settlers in establishing homes form an interesting and important part of the story. These phases have been fictionalized by Marion Jackson in a thrilling and tense story, brimming with action and romance. Ken Maynard gives a fine supporting cast, with Dorothy Dwan, Tom Santschi, Gilman Goodland, Noah Young and Billy Batts among the principals.
