Fishing Better Early in June But Still Slack

ASTORIA, Ore., June 10.—Fishing during the first week in June showed a material improvement over late May but still remains slack.

On Wednesday of this week deliveries showed a sudden gain which gave rise to hopes that the fishing generally would improve, but the advance proved to be only a spurt, which subsided again immediately, the catch during the remainder of the week dropping down to about what it was in the first two days of the period.

The salmon catch, however, was considerably better than those of the last two weeks in May, which is a distinct change in the fish which have averaged much larger than heretofore this season.

Despite several weeks of slim fishing, all elements of the industry are sanguine of the future, expecting that the catch will continue to increase.

Seining operations on a large scale are scheduled for commencing next week, when the Halcyon boats of Sand Island are due to get going. Other grounds are also expected to start up.
