Start all the perennials early. Don't wait until July if you want to be sure of bloom next year.

Sow cardinal climber seed now. It won't grow until the ground is good and warm but makes up in speed for slowness in germination.

The quickest, easiest and surest method of canning vegetables at home is to pack them boiling hot and process all, except tomatoes, under steam pressure. The length of time each vegetable should be processed is given in Farmers' Bulletin 1471-P, "Canning Fruits and Vegetables at Home," which may be obtained free from the United States Department of Ag-riculture.
