

2 Escape From County Jail In Roseburg, Ore.

ROSEBURG, June 12 (AP)—By sawing out a section of the ceiling of the steel cage in the Douglas county jail, Harry Rogers, formerly of Grants Pass, held on a charge of Turkey stealer, and Harold Specker, deaf and dumb auto theft suspect, escaped last night and efforts to recapture them have so far been unavailing. Five other prisoners confined in the jail refused to take advantage of the avenue of escape.

Several years ago an alteration was made in the jail arrangement and a metal plate was welded over a hole through which the stove pipe formerly passed. Since that time several prisoners have made their escape by sawing off the bars around this plate, despite efforts of the county to make the jail secure.

Rogers and Specker are believed to have had outside assistance in their jailbreak and escape. Sheriff Starnes stated this morning that he is looking for Mrs. Rogers, whom he believed aided the prisoners by passing the saws into the cell and by having an automobile ready for them following the break. Mrs. Rogers, who has been stopping at a local hotel, has been missing since the time of the escape.

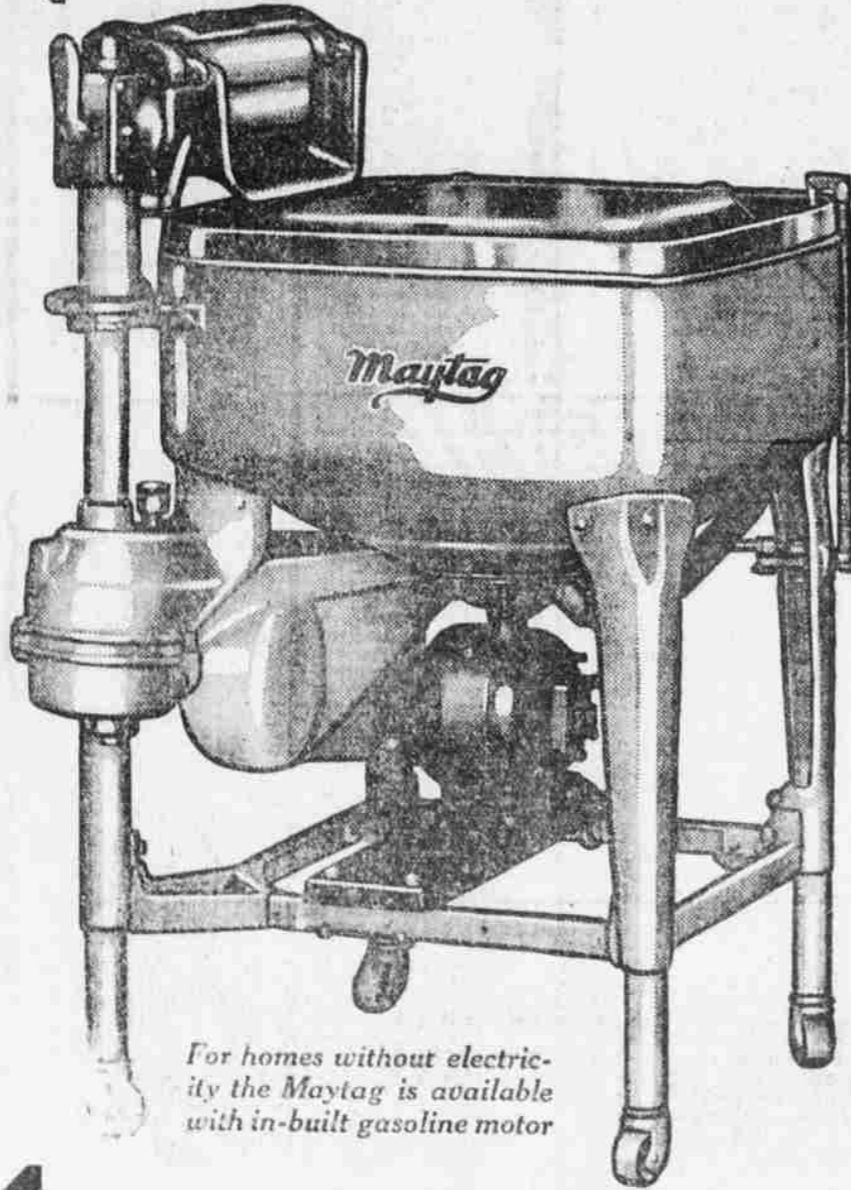

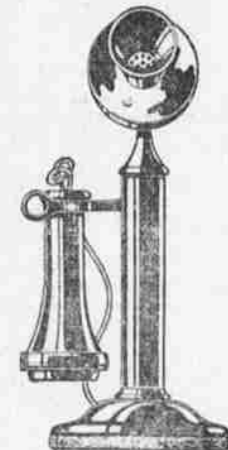
