FELLOW WORKERS RAISE \$20,000 TO BUY AIRPLANE FOR TRANS-PACIFIC ENTRANT

By Wm. C. Fetheridge—SAN FRANCISCO, June 8 (NEA Service)—Next on the program of aerial achievement, inspired by Captain Charles Lindbergh's flight across the Atlantic, is the conquering of the Pacific.

And, when 30 or more aerial stars hop off from here or some other Pacific port in August, as planned, there will be one contestant in the race who will be followed during the dramatic hours of flight with breathless interest by a small army of Pacific coast industrial workers...

The workers are employees of the Paraffine Co., Inc., a large western industrial concern; the aviator will be Major Livingston G. Irving, flying mate in France of Captain Charles Nungesser, and one of their fellow employees.

And if the 23-year-old Irving happens to be the first to touch Honolulu soil his success will be due primarily to the contributions of articles and dimes and dollars from his industrial colleagues who, in less than two hours on May 23, raised \$20,000 to purchase a plane for Irving so that he might attempt the trans-oceanic dash.

How Major Irving was permitted to land in his entry for the rich Pacific world specialties forms a human interest episode of the aviation race in the following story.

When Irving, son of S. A. Irving, treasurer and director of the company, first expressed a desire to make the flight he thought that his ambition must be thwarted because he had no plane. But his co-workers came to his rescue. A fund was started at the main office, and other company plants up and down the coast, work of Irving's desire was soon realized about.

Within a short time the entire \$20,000 had been pledged. Office boys gave their weekly salaries, telephone girls put themselves down for from 12 to 14 dollars each, and the company's employees, many hundreds of them, gave in their spare time, in their plant, workers on the production in the company's plants rushed forward with their bit.

A wife was distinguished by the fact in the Boeing Airplane Co., at Seattle, Wash., furnishing it a plane which is constructed in time for him to join the Pacific Coast-Border boys to start Aug. 15. It was assumed that it would.

Major Irving has an enviable record. He was a flying ace in France of Captain Charles Nungesser, and later served with the Lafayette Legion in New York, 1918, Irving, then a lieutenant, was cited for distinguished service. He and a companion, Lieutenant Eaton of New York, were credited with having attacked Fokker planes and, after having shot two down, forced the remaining three to retreat. He was awarded the distinguished service cross for his exploits.

Class Graduates; Joseph Schafer U. of O. Speaker

EUGENE, Ore., June 12 (AP)—Joseph Schafer, superintendent of the Wisconsin Historical society, delivering the commencement address at the University of Oregon today, discussed the history of yesterday and today, looking into the future, he said, indications are that the degree given by an institution of higher learning will soon be a certificate showing definite accomplishment in particular departments with special proficiency.

"In the university of tomorrow," he said, "the subject or field of study, promise to be the limit rather than the center, leading us in the past to a degree.
