The Garden

KEEP ON PLANTING CORN Few home gardeners ever had more sweet corn than they really wanted. These fortunate gardeners who have had a surplus always found a ready market among the neighbors and heading could not wait for winter use. So keep on planting corn. Of course you will want Golden Bantam, but there are other very fine varieties of corn, and Country Gentleman, Howling Moth, and Stewart's Evergreen still retain their reputations as well as several hybrids between these larger-cared varieties and Golden Bantam which has carried its yellow flavor and sugary quality into its offspring.

These larger types of corn are regarded as better for the late crop by some gardeners than Golden Bantam, but they are in a minority and the home gardener is content to stick to the miniature quality of Golden Bantam even if the cobs are of bantam size.

Corn planted in warm, summer weather grows faster than the earliest planted crops and many experts insist that the finest flavored sweet corn is produced by June plantings.

A few hills of corn put in at intervals of two weeks in the small home garden will keep up the succession and supply until frost. The

People who plan a long trip by automobile this summer should, therefore, beware of indiscriminate drinking of water and milk. They should carry a supply of drinking water in the car with them so that they will not be forced to drink water from some well which may look pure and clean, but which may be badly infected with typhoid germs.

Means of Prevention. As a means of prevention, purity of water supply is most important. Wells are dangerous because they easily become infected. All suspected water should be boiled if there is no known pure supply at hand. This applies with force to irrigation canals, etc.

Drink only perfectly sterilized milk. Protect all food and drink from flies. Remove outdoor litter, screen windows. "Swat the fly."

Raw vegetables, in line of typhoid prevention, should not be eaten.

The bodily discharges of the sick should be mixed immediately with chloride of lime or formal solution, and ground vaccination, the same sort of "typhoid shots" which protected millions of American soldiers during the world war, are of extreme value.

WHY HAVE TYPHOID FEVER THIS SUMMER

American Homes Are Brightened At Small Cost

Wherever you may be, the American farm woman is an exponent of economical home improvement, government data shows. Through county home demonstration agents and perhaps the state home-furnishing specialist, she has learned how to brighten her surroundings in a bright time and with a small expenditure. The accompanying picture is considered an outstanding example. It shows a living-room from which wall paper, unattractively from twenty years' use, was removed. The plaster was patched and the walls given two coats of dark green paint.

An old wood-burner stove, in use for many years, was removed and the fireplace cleaned and repainted. An old-fashioned pair of armchairs, with tongs and shovel, was purchased for \$1.10 and the whole fire place painted blue.

The floor, already in good condition, was cleaned and oiled. All woodwork in the room was painted a dark brown color. Old chairs were painted or varnished. Stone crocks bought at a sale, were painted yellow for use as vases. A small writing desk was made of boards and broom handle.

Taps were dyed yellow and brown and fashioned into a rug. A table runner, silk under, from an old linen sheet dyed yellow. Linoleum curtains were fashioned of cream serge, and the valance and side-drapes made of material already on hand.

Candlesticks were purchased for ten cents, bringing the entire cost of improvement to a total of \$10.50.

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 14 (AP)—The fifty-fourth annual meeting of the Oregon State grange opened here today on the campus of Oregon Agricultural college and the sessions will continue until Friday.
