Luckily for the Phillies who were only a game ahead of the Cubs, they too beat down invading foe, a tight pitching grip by Carmen Hill and held the Boston Braves harmless in the pinches for a 7 to 4 decision. On the steam of the daze, Vance, the Brooklyn Robins downed the Cincinnati Reds by 2 to 1.

The White Sox' 6 to 4 victory over the Athletics yesterday was the first game in the American league in two days, because of rain.

Doubt Change Of Management

NEW YORK, June 16 (AP)—Advisers received by New York newspapers from staff men with the Giants in St. Louis today cast doubt on a statement credited to John McGraw by the St. Louis Post-Dispatch to the effect that he would turn over the entire management of the New York Giants to Rogers Hornsby after next season.

The version of correspondents of New York papers is that McGraw said Hornsby would in all probability succeed him when he did retire.

Charles A. Stoneham, president of the Giants after reading the Post-Dispatch story, as carried by the Associated Press said: "I telephoned Mr. McGraw in St. Louis. He denied having made any such statement. I can't understand it."

MAD BULL IN VAN IN LONG RACE TODAY

SANTA ROSA, Cal., June 16 (AP)—Mad Bull, Karack Indian, at 1:30 a. m. today was in the van of the eleven Indians who left San Francisco Tuesday morning on a 450-mile marathon to Grants Pass, Ore. He passed through Hopland, 52 miles north of here, at that time two miles ahead of Pateon, in second place, who in turn was leading Flying Cloud by a quarter of a mile. Reached within seven miles farther back were five other Indians, including two of the Zunis, Meitha and Chochee, both going strong.

Janon, the third Zuni, was forced by badly blistered feet to stop 5 miles north of here, at Robins Nest, and return for treatment. However, he soon resumed running.

Construction Of Branch Is Started

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16 (AP)—Construction of a branch line from Klamath Falls to Alturas was started yesterday by the Southern Pacific railway, Paul Shoup, executive president of the company, announced.

Shoup, writing from New York late yesterday said: "That we may not be in default under authorization by the U. S. C. requiring starting to be begun on the line between Klamath Falls and Alturas on or before June 17, we have commenced construction today."

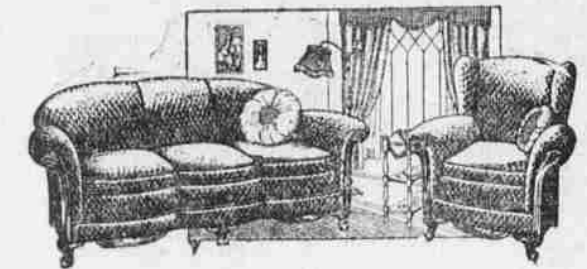

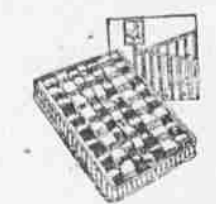

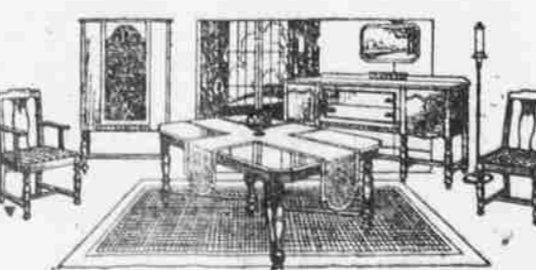
