SUMMER FRUITS ON PORTLAND MART

Cherries Bring \$2 for 15 Pound Box; Peaches, Apricots Appear

PORTLAND, Ore., June 15 (AP)—Summer fruits are taking the market with royal name cherries, Alexander peaches and a few apricots represented. The cherries from the Mary Hill, Wash., district brought \$2 per 15 pound box. The peaches from California, mostly at \$2.25 to \$2.75 per box, according to size. Apricots from southern points moved at \$1.25 per 24 pound box.

Local lettuce at \$1.25 and \$1.50 per crate, cabbage at 6 1/2 to 7 per pound, and peas at 7 to 10 per bushel. Other grades are unchanged.

Best eggs, extras, are down a cent to 25c on the local dairy exchange, while firsts are down a cent to 21c. Other grades are unchanged.

Butter prices for cubes are unchanged from yesterday on the dairy exchange. Storage stocks were increased by 1,250 pounds yesterday.

Fresh poultry dressed meats and poultry are about steady.

Record Trout Egg Take Is Belief

KIAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 15 (AP)—What is believed to be a new world's record trout egg take has been obtained at the Diamond Lake egg station, according to a long distance phone call yesterday from Lloyd Tucker, in charge of the station.

The record 17 1/2 million eggs is one-half million more than the high mark set in 1925 when 17 1/2 million eggs were taken.

The eggs are "young" and today the laborious task of hauling them over spaw covered trails and roads will start. Tucker will be aided in this work by District Game Warden Milton J. Barton.

Further Recovery Is Made Today In Stock Market

NEW YORK, June 16 (AP)—The stock market today made further recovery from the sharp recession of Tuesday, with head-and-tail buying in the railroad group and certain established industrial leaders. Strength of these issues contrasted, however, with unimpaired signs of forced liquidation in a handful of specialties.

Steady absorption of General Motors 17, R. Steel and Baldwin and many of the rail shares gave impetus to the upward trend, carrying more than a dozen issues into new high ground for the year. General Motors reach 26 1/2—a gain of 5 points, and only fractionally under its peak price for all time. Rock Island got to 11 1/2 and St. Louis-Southwestern 8 1/2, both the highest ever attained.

The closing was irregular. Profit-taking sales became more nervous in popular shares, in final stages. General Motors reacting 2 points when new points of weakness developed elsewhere. Bangor and Aroostook fell 7 points and Park and Tilford and Lehigh

The Persian women have started a campaign for dress reform. They are objecting seriously to the Moslem veil, and are not only demanding, but actually buying hats in large numbers. So far, they wear the hats only after dark when they walk out with husbands or sons in the streets where they are apt to encounter Europeans. But the mere fact of walking abroad at night is sufficiently radical for the moment. Some day some Persian social leader is going to wear her new Paris hat to an afternoon tea—and then it will be all over with the veil.

WEATHER AS USUAL

This was to be the summerless year, according to the scientific weather prophets. So far it has shown no signs at all of living up to their forecast.

The United States weather bureau has recently completed a summary of weather conditions for the months of March, April and May. Believe them or not, their figures and data show that for the country as a whole, temperatures averaged from normal to two degrees above normal during these months.

The weather has been tricky, these experts admit, so tricky as to fool the inexperienced observer. In certain sections there was twice the normal amount of rainfall and in some of the western states the temperature ranged from normal to three degrees below normal.

But even these peculiar aberrations are normal and natural. "People forget," says a meteorologist of the department of agriculture, "that the usual kind of weather is unusual. There were killing frosts during the spring months, but there always are killing frosts in that period."

So there we are! And after all, the weather is one of our best friends and most reliable standbys. It is always with us in one version or another, to be enjoyed, to be complained about, to furnish topics of conversation, to let the local weather man about, to enable us to prophesy and marvel to our heart's content.
