

IMPROVE DAIRYING WITH BETTER COWS

Dairy Industry Is Largest on American Farms; Issue Now Is Economy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ask Dr. C. W. Larson, United States dairy chief, to picture a future for the dairy industry and he'll push across his desk this group of figures:

Four and a half million farms in America have dairy cattle.

The total number of cows on these farms is 17,500,000.

The annual farm value of dairy products is \$2,750,000,000.

Population in the United States, 1926, 100,000,000.

Per capita consumption of milk, 175 pounds per year.

There are 121 active cow-testing associations in the United States with an enrolled total of 260,000 cows, each producing an average of 6,500 pounds of milk annually.

"All of which means," says Dr. Larson, "that if every cow in the nation produced as much milk as the accredited cattle, the United States would not need even one additional dairy cow for a quarter of a century."

The conclusion is purely a scientific one, Dr. Larson explains, and is true in possibility rather than probability.

"As a matter of fact," he continues, "it's the number of individual owners and not the cows that is decreasing."

The movement is toward a higher grade cow, and high production herds are, as a rule, increased.

"Dairying is the biggest American farm industry. The price because now is economy in production. The fact that the amount of milk a cow produces and its quality are the greatest factors in economy has led to the general development of better herds. Owners realize

Indian Children Join Farm Clubs

WASHINGTON (AP)—More than 3,500 Indian boys and girls have been enrolled during the past year in juvenile agricultural clubs, statistics at the interior department show.

Last year Indian club members raised products valued at \$43,752, including corn, potatoes, other vegetables, poultry and farm animals. Canning clubs and sewing circles are credited with splendid work.

Among those winning high honors in the corn club was Hannah High Hawk, a 12-year-old full blood Sioux girl of the Choyenne reservation in South Dakota. She was awarded a free trip to the National Corn congress.

Dr. Larson calls attention to the work of cow-testing organizations. It has been found that the 360,000 accredited cows produce as much milk as 584,000 ordinary cows, and as much financial profit as 640,000 average cows.

Better bred cows are the backbone of the dairy industry, the dairy chief declares. And the improved dairy also seems to be the best solution of the dairy-breeding problem.

While at times it may cost more to feed a high quality cow, true economy is in the increased production.

T. B. Kay Tells Why He Favors State Income Tax

SALEM, Ore., June 16 (Special)

Following is a statement by Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer, regarding the state income tax measure which will be on the ballot at the special June 25 election:

"I did not favor the income tax measure proposed for adoption at the general election in 1926 because I considered them unfair and discriminatory. I was further opposed to them then for the reason that I thought the adoption by the State of Oregon of an income tax law of the tenor of the two measures voted upon would be detrimental to the interests of the state at large in that, if they had been adopted, Oregon would have been the only western state with an income tax law. The adoption of either of the measures submitted at that time in my opinion would have had a deterrent effect upon the establishment of new manufacturing and industrial enterprises within the state."

Notwithstanding this fact I now believe that the present income tax law to be submitted to popular vote on June 28 next should be approved. The condition of the finances of the state of Oregon at the present time calls for emergency relief and warrants the enactment of a reasonable law to provide necessary revenue for state purposes. I consider the terms and provisions of the proposed income

tax law fair and reasonable. While the objection that Oregon would be the only western state with an income tax law would still exist if the present measure is approved by the people, the proposed law is nevertheless much more equitable in its provisions than was the previous law in operation in Oregon or those voted upon at the November election. The exigency of the present situation renders imperative the passage of laws which will provide the funds with which to pay state appropriation in excess of current revenue.

The income tax law together with the companion measure providing for an amendment to the constitution authorizing a property tax levy in December 1928, of \$1,500,000 plus tax six per cent thereof less estimated receipts from income taxes during the year 1929, and authorizing for ensuing years a successive increase at the rate of six per cent, less estimated receipts from income taxes, would provide the necessary revenues. These measures, if approved, would serve the further purpose of relieving to a considerable extent the tax burden on real property. The burden, in fact, would be shifted to incomes received by persons who at present are paying little if any of the expense of state government.

It should be distinctly borne in mind, however, that unless both the income tax act and the measure providing for reestablishing the property tax base are both concurrently adopted the financial condition of the state of Oregon will remain as at present and the state will be required to borrow from outside sources in order to pay current expenses.

In my opinion these measures constitute the only present solution to the financial problem with which the state is confronted and for that reason I give them my support.

Millions Wait Discussion Of Summer Course

The American Institute of Cooperation, expected to attract approximately 1,000 persons to its annual summer course in Chicago, June 20 to July 25, is controlled by agricultural organizations representing more than 5,000,000 farmers.

Among the 22 organizations electing trustees to the institute are: The California Fruit Growers Exchange, American Farm Bureau Federation, Farmers' Educational and Cooperative Union, National Live Stock Producers' association, National Association of Commissioners, Secretaries, and Department of Agriculture, Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers, Illinois Agricultural association, National Cooperative Milk Producers' Federation, Staple Cotton Cooperative association of Mississippi, Sun Maid Raisin Growers, and National Board of Farm Organizations.

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
