QUARANTINE ORDER NO. 1

Pertaining to Alfalfa Weevil in Oregon

(With Regulations)

The fact has been determined by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture that an insect pest injurious to alfalfa and other forage crops, known as alfalfa weevil (*Phytonomus posoniensis*, Gyll.), new to and not heretofore prevalent or widely distributed within the State of Oregon, exists in the counties of Malheur, Baker and Union, State of Oregon, and that alfalfa hay, and other hay and cereal straw, alfalfa meal, alfalfa seed, baggage, emigrant movables, household effects, household implements, camping effects, camping implements, livestock, potatoes, nursery stock, used alfalfa milling machinery, and all machinery, implements, bags, and other containers that have been used in the milling, baling, hatching, or threshing of alfalfa, railroad cars, automobiles, automobile trailers, trucks and other vehicles are liable to be carriers of said alfalfa weevil.

Now, therefore, I, Chas. A. Park, President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, under the authority conferred by section 2 of chapter 245, of the General Laws of Oregon of 1912, and section 4 of chapter 245, of the General Laws of Oregon of 1915, consider it necessary, in order to further the spread of the alfalfa weevil (*Phytonomus posoniensis*) within the State of Oregon, do hereby quarantine the counties of Malheur, Baker and Union, State of Oregon, and from and after the publication of this order in three newspapers published within the State of Oregon it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to carry or transport alfalfa hay, and any other hay and cereal straw, alfalfa meal, alfalfa seed, baggage, emigrant movables, household effects, household implements, camping effects, camping implements, livestock, potatoes, nursery stock, used alfalfa milling machinery, and all machinery, implements, bags, and other containers that have been used in the milling, baling, hatching, or threshing of alfalfa, railroad cars, automobiles, automobile trailers, trucks and other vehicles from said infested territory except as hereinafter provided.

Regulation 1. Alfalfa hay and other hay and cereal straw and alfalfa meal, except as hereinafter provided, that has been grown, manufactured or stored in the said infested territory is hereby prohibited from moving from said infested territory into any other section of the State of Oregon for any purpose whatsoever, and upon the arrival of any such hay or straw or meal as so transported against this order, the same shall be immediately returned to point of origin, or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agent or agents.

Regulation 2. Alfalfa meal or mixed meal which contains alfalfa meal will be admitted into other sections of the State of Oregon from said infested territory from mills which are approved in writing by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, as being so constructed and operated as to conform to adequate safeguard requirements for the prevention of alfalfa weevil infestation or contamination of the alfalfa meal, provided that all such alfalfa meal is sacked and shipped immediately after it is milled, such milling, sacking, and shipping to be done during the period November 1 to March 31; provided further, that such alfalfa meal is shipped in new or rebanded burlap bags and loaded in tight railroad cars which have not been used in carrying alfalfa hay to the mill, and provided further that each shipment of alfalfa meal as above is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture establishing the fact that all of the alfalfa meal in the shipment has been milled, sacked and shipped in accordance with the above requirements. Such certificate must also state the name and location of the mill which manufactured the product, the name and address of the consignee, the amount of the shipment, the number and initials of the car containing the shipment, and the date on which the alfalfa meal was milled, sacked and shipped. A copy of the certificate must be mailed at the time of shipment to the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, Salem, Oregon. Any approval granted by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture to any mill covering the shipment of alfalfa meal from the mill as provided above, may be revoked by him at any time he is convinced that such mill is not meeting adequate safeguard measures.

Regulation 3. An official certificate, signed by an inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture shall accompany each shipment of potatoes grown in or shipped from the said infested territory into any other section of the State of Oregon. Such certificate shall establish the fact that all potatoes in the shipment have been passed over a screen immediately prior to loading into a car, placed in fresh, clean sacks and loaded in cars that are free from alfalfa hay or other hay or cereal straw. All shipments of potatoes from said infested territory, not accompanied by certificates as heretofore provided for, shall be immediately returned to the point of origin or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agent or agents.

Regulation 4. All nursery and ornamental stock and other plants carried or transported into any other section of Oregon from said infested territory shall be packed in from nurseries, greenhouses or other suitable packing (except burlap, hay, straw), and each shipment must be accompanied by an official certificate establishing the fact that such package in the shipment has been fumigated for a period of one hour for alfalfa weevil in an airtight enclosure subsequent to being boxed, baled or packed for shipment, with cyanide of potassium or sodium at the rate of one ounce to each cubic foot of space. All shipments of nursery or ornamental stock and other plants as enumerated in this regulation, not accompanied by a certificate as heretofore provided for, shall be refused admittance into any other section of the State of Oregon and all such shipments shall be immediately returned to the point of origin or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agent or agents.

Regulation 5. No shipment of household effects, emigrant movables, camping implements, camping effects, camping implements, used farming implements and other field appliances brought into the alfalfa weevil free sections of Oregon by other than common carrier transportation from said infested territory shall be placed in quarantine by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, his deputy or deputies, or his representative in the district or county into which such articles are imported or brought until it has been determined by inspection that the same is free from alfalfa weevil.

Regulation 6. It shall be the duty of all common carriers to clean and free from alfalfa hay and other hay and cereal straw, alfalfa hay and other hay and cereal straw in or through any part of the

infested territory before the same enter other sections of the State of Oregon.

Regulation 7. Used alfalfa milling machinery and other machinery and implements that have been used in the baling, milling, hatching or threshing of alfalfa will be admitted into other sections of the State of Oregon from the said infested territory only upon compliance with the following requirements: Persons contemplating transporting any of the enumerated articles from the said infested territory into other sections of Oregon shall first make application to the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture for a permit to do so, stating in the application the name and address of the shipper, the locality from which the shipment is to be made, a description of the articles for which a permit is requested, the terminal point of delivery and the name and address of the person to whom the permit should be sent. Any and all such shipments of machinery and implements heretofore enumerated in this regulation transported into other sections of Oregon from said infested territory under authority of permit issued by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture shall have attached to each shipment a certificate signed by an inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture showing the number of the permit to transport and establish the fact that all the machinery and implements included in the shipment have been cleaned, and fumigated with hydrocyanic acid gas before being loaded for shipment, the date and place of fumigation, and the amount of cyanide used in the fumigation of the shipment covered by the certificate. Any and all shipments of machinery and/or implements not accompanied by a certificate as provided for in this regulation shall be refused admittance to non-infested territory and shall be returned immediately to point of origin at the expense of owner, consignee or agent.

Regulation 8. Automobiles, automobile trailers, trucks and other vehicles arriving at the boundaries of non-infested territory, from said infested territory, shall be placed in quarantine by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, his deputy or deputies, or his representative in the district or county into which such vehicles arrive, until it has been determined by inspection that the same is free from alfalfa weevil.

Regulation 9. Baggage, emigrant movables, household effects, household implements, camping effects, camping implements, used farming implements and other field appliances brought into the alfalfa weevil free sections of Oregon by other than common carrier transportation from said infested territory shall be placed in quarantine by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, his deputy or deputies, or his representative in the district or county into which such articles are imported or brought until it has been determined by inspection that the same is free from alfalfa weevil.

Regulation 10. Alfalfa seed will be admitted into the alfalfa weevil free sections of Oregon from said infested territory, only when contained in bags or containers which have not been previously used in the carrying of alfalfa products other than released alfalfa seed. This order supersedes Quarantine Order No. 7, issued October 3, 1926, and amendment thereto, issued October 8, 1927, and Quarantine Order No. 11, issued September 26, 1927.

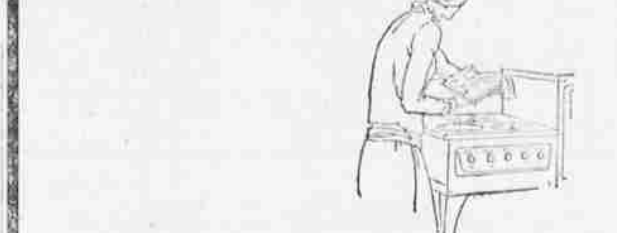
