SCOTIA, Cal., June 18 (AP)—Retaining his nine-mile lead over his nearest opponent, Mad Bull, Karok Indian, passed through Burlington, 30 miles south of Scotia, today. He had passed the half way point in the 480-mile Redwood Highway Indian marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore.

Race observers did not say much about the nine-mile lead, however, because Melika, Zuni Indian, was the one who trailed Mad Bull, and Melika had not started running yet.
