Women in Sports Meet Opposition In Great Britain

LONDON (AP)—Eve's headway in the arena of sports has kicked up a row which has been another day's sport. The fact that men do not like to beat women at games nor in the other hand is hated by them has brought the question to a head.

Alarm and indignation has been expressed by many of the increasing following by numbers of women of the "total sport" which, until a few years ago, were regarded as the exclusive preserve of their husbands and brothers.

Some of the golf clubs have already considered protests that there were too many women members, while the increasing participation of housewives in steep-climbing and point-to-point races is regarded by opponents to be incompatible with the best competitive spirit which enters into these contests.

The latest outcry is against women football. It is contended by one authority that women should not participate with men on the football ground, but about four have their own view.

In like contention it is pointed out that the Wells Observer's football club has banned women from the arena on the ground that they have proved "an absolute nuisance."

E. K. Moore, former president of the English Football association, said a former English champion, Mrs. A. M. Moore.

"Men do not like to play with members of the opposite sex, chiefly because we do not like to beat or to lose to a woman. This applies particularly to competitions. Women should form their own clubs."

A British woman's bowling club recently sent her affiliation to the governing County Bowling association, but she was turned them down.

George Hills, secretary of the English Bowling association, says there is no reason why women should not play bowls so long as they don't encroach on men's sport.

The one branch of sport in which women are not very common appears to be tennis. "The more the better" is the slogan of the women on both sides.

Washington Crews Win at Wisconsin

MADISON, Wis., June 17 (AP)—Four of the six rowing teams in the silver-tipped race to Wisconsin's variety and fishermen eight Saturday in a beautiful exhibition of a picturesque sport.

Farm Pointers

Farmers who have streams running through their property and who cultivate their land to the water's edge frequently find the banks eroding and valuable soil washing away during high water periods. A fringe of trees and vegetative growth along such streams will help materially in keeping the banks intact.

Irregular feeding hours seem to affect some more than irregular milking hours.

Next to overstocking, the early grazing is chiefly responsible for deterioration of range on cattle range lands. The yield of forage on cattle range lands. The yield of forage is much less if the plants of the range are not well cared for and are not kept in the best condition.

Grading too early in the season starts the vegetation and does not satisfy the purpose of the animal because of the low nutritive value of short forage. Grading early twice, or even three times, during the season is not detrimental provided the first cropping is large enough and the intervals between are sufficiently long for the vegetation to recover.

Humidities in hay may be caused by absorption of toxic material, but exposure to cold, wet weather is an important predisposing cause. The animals thus affected move in a slow, painful way. Sometimes there is stiffness and it worse than any leg is affected the legs are stiffened to walk. The appetite is impaired. Treatment by administration of little acid. The hay should be kept constantly covered and away from cold drafts. Feed a healthy diet and make to exercise as much as possible under favorable weather conditions.
