AGREEMENT TO BE BASED ON PRESENT PLANS

(Continued from Page 1) limitation of auxiliary naval vessels in terms of ratio, but assured him that Japan earnestly desired to reach an agreement and believe one could be achieved if all the factors in the situation of the various nations were taken into consideration. After the meeting the leaders denied the report that Viscount Saito had flatly notified the American delegate that Japan was unable to accept the 5-5-3 ratio for auxiliaries.

Begin Technical Study

While the leaders were tackling the broad political aspects of the American, British and Japanese proposals the naval experts of the three delegations met to begin a technical study of the three plans in order to ascertain to exact proportion various phrases in them. Rear Admiral Frank H. Schofield, the first of the three American experts present, is director of the war plans division of the navy department while Captain Adolphus Andrews is commander of the submarine base at New London, Conn. At the conclusion of the technical meetings a communique was issued reading: "The technical committee established June 21 by resolution of the executive committee of the conference met today to exchange information with a view to elucidating in more detailed manner the respective proposals."

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 22 (AP)—President Coolidge abandoned the Wisconsin ball for trout fishing and took the fly on his last trip to Squaw creek, it was disclosed today. Using his Isaac Walton method of angling, Mr. Coolidge brought in six fishes. One of the callers today at the executive offices, Edward G. Taylor, Chicago newspaper man and member of the Isaac Walton League, declared the league was opposed to angling for trout with worms. Taylor did not see the president personally. After a call on Secretary Sanders, the Chicagoan said the league desires to make fishing "a sporting proposition and not a meat proposition."

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Return to Homes
