Fading after failing to beat the Pirates in their two-game duel for the lead, the Cubs, who recently won 12 games straight, have now dropped four in a row, three of which went to the Pirates, the average of the rising Cardinals. The latest was won yesterday 11 to 5, and gave the Cards a clean sweep of the Cubs series. It was a personal triumph for Grover Cleveland Alexander.

Still out in front and holding their own, the Pirates outscored their hitting partners and dropped the Reds by 11 to 5.

Habe Ruth's 23rd and 24th homers in the first game helped the Yankees to their seven to four victory over the Red Sox and made him all even with his homering showing for the same point in 1921, his record year. The 2 to 2 decision in the second game was won on a minimum of hitting with Stocker out-standing his opponent Huffing.

At Thomas scored his 11th victory of the season in pitching the second place Sox to an 8 to 5 victory over the Browns in the second game of their double bill. The first was lost in 10 innings 3 to 2. Fighting the Athletics for their third place running, the Senators heated them in the first session 4 to 2, on the pitching 2 to 1. The second game, also lost, saw new pitcher Knicker, who had won the advantage in a 12 to 7 defeat at the A's stadium 15 hits off two less potent pitchers.

Fighting Stag Finishes Fourth In Long Race

GRANT PARK, Ore., June 23 (AP)—Almost a day and a half behind the leader in the 430-mile 72-hour highway marathon, Fighting Stag came in to the finish line this morning at 8:52 running strong. Mad Bull, Flying Cloud and Melita had preceded him over the tape. Three others, Talcott, Snake and Big White Deer were still running, having passed Fighting Stag's clock, 43 miles out early this morning. They were to be in tonight.

Not a single Indian entered in the race shows any ill effects from the longest marathon on record. Given Mellin, 55-year-old Zuni, after about two hours rest, appeared yesterday evening at a banquet given here for the runners. The aged Zuni runner was given an ovation and his face, usually stolid, occasionally broke into a smile.

There were seven of the runners who had started at San Francisco here last night. Not a one showed signs of weariness after short rests and their trainers stated that they were not even stiff.

Foot trouble and sore leg muscles were the most common troubles along the way. Jamon, the youngest Zuni, was forced out when hot pavement blistered his feet. The others also had similar trouble but Mad Bull, the winner, reported little trouble of this kind.

Salmon Fishing Better Than At First of Season

ASTORIA—Expectations of improved fishing this week borne out by the early deliveries at Astoria canneries. While many of the fishermen were still operating and by no means all have delivered, gill-net catches reported showed an average of nearly 200 pounds of salmon to the boat, which is better fishing than has been experienced since the first week of the season.

The gillnets are getting all the fish, however, as the traps and the few seines operating have done but little.

The Barbey Packing company is preparing to start wining on the Welch sands in the river opposite Astoria.

Bluebacks continue to come to the canneries and there appears no doubt but that the run is in progress. Deliveries thus far have been but light, however, due to the fact that the run is only developing and that comparatively little blueback gear is yet being fished.

Fleeter nets are being severely handicapped by the large amount of drift in the river, particularly when fishing at night. Diver nets avoid much of this trouble and have been making good catches.

WINS ENGLISH MARATHON

LONDON (AP)—S. S. Ferris of the Royal Air Force, brought victory to England in the annual open marathon race from Windsor to London, a distance of 26 miles, 385 yards.

Ferris made the distance in two hours and 46 minutes. This is the third time he has proved successful in this event. S. Natale (Italy) and Marien (Belgium), the long distance champions of their respective countries, were second and third.
