

CREATED RESERVE AND CAUSED ROW

Coolidge Second President
Linked with Black
Hills in S. Dakota

WASHINGTON (AP)—Calvin Coolidge is the second president whose name has been linked with the Black Hills of South Dakota. The other was Grover Cleveland.

Coolidge, however, is enjoying the facilities for rest and recreation there, whereas Cleveland was violently denounced and threatened with impeachment because he created the Black Hills forest reserve, February 22, 1897, the birthday of the first president, George Washington.

When Cleveland set aside the reserve, virtually all of the timbered section of the Black Hills region was included and Charles Lathrop, president of the National Tree association, pointed out that it became the first national forest to be placed under scientific management in the United States. It has produced millions of feet of lumber and has brought thousands of dollars into the federal treasury.

One of its early administrators was Carl Roth, a "Union States" marshal and close friend of Theodore Roosevelt. Roth, gathered a staff of forest rangers who, back in the days of the frontier, had been employed in any national reservation, including such men as "Cap" Smith, an Indian fighter, and still a resident of the region, living at Starvation on the edge of the hills.

Fires have caused enormous damage in the Black Hills, but the rangers' efforts have saved magnificent forests of yellow pine from the flames. Before the white man emigrated so far from the Atlantic seaboard, fires caused by lightning or Indian campers burned the hills. A few Indians are still living who remember the time, about 50 years ago, when the whole mountainous region seemed to be ablaze. The Indians in those days regarded the hills as holy ground, burying dead and still spirits, and they entered them only on annual hunting excursions.

When hay rams are not used, one may see the top of the field starks to a depth of several inches, causing the hay to lose its natural green color and turn dark. Even a small amount of off-colored hay showing in the bale may reduce its selling price unreasonably. Direct sunlight causes alfalfa to lose its green color and become lighter in color if caps are not used. Caps made from heavy material, such as canvas, will last longer under similar conditions than light-weight ones.

Dairymen Suggest Small-Mouth Pails

Foreign substance clinging to the flanks and sides of a cow at milking time has been known to contain fifty million bacteria per gram.

For that reason dairymen suggest the use of a small-mouth milk pail, even if the cow is kept scrupulously clean.

Too much precaution cannot be taken, they say, to keep these pails, pieces of bedding and other quarters from falling into the pails to contaminate the milk.

Custom demands that a work horse be groomed daily, for more reason exists, dairymen declare, for the daily grooming of a cow that produces human food.

They insist that before milking the udders, flanks and sides of all cows should be carefully wiped with a clean, damp cloth.

Publishes Life "Under 5 Sultans"

CONSTANTINOPLE (AP)—Dr. Mary Mills Patrick, president emerita of the Constantinian Women's college, is publishing the story of her life, "Under Five Sultans," after 22 years of educational work in Turkey.

Dr. Patrick came to Turkey in 1871, when she was 21, and began the work of developing a small mission school into an international college for women. Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, describes her as "doing a man's work with a woman's skill and a woman's devotion."
