

CONTRACT WOOL AT GOOD PRICE

Sheep Men Face Good Year; Lambs "Topped Out" Help Market

WALLA WALLA, Wash.—Approximately 400,000 pounds of wool, owned by sheep men contracting their business at Walla Walla, have been contracted this spring to wool buyers at prices ranging from 20 to 28 cents a pound and, so far as is known here, not a clip of consequence remains unsold at this time.

The wool clip proved to be average in both weight and quality, although there has been a shortage throughout the Northwest, price averaged about two cents under the prevailing prices of one year ago.

Goes Into Trade Channel
The \$100,000 or more realized from wool sales will virtually all go into trade channels of this vicinity, it being figured that operating expenses, such as wages, grazing, feed and transportation costs are just about taken care of by the wool sales.

A better than average outlook for lambs is reported by those who sell their young fat stock on the middle western markets. Between July 1 and 30 the season for lambs fattened in this portion of the Northwest is usually at its best and some top quality stuff is being prepared for the markets at Chicago during these three weeks.

"Topping Out" Is Practiced
"Topping out" of lambs is now the practice of local sheep men, the result being that the best market prices are being obtained. Instead of shipping a large quantity of good, bad and medium stuff, flocks are gone over at intervals and prime stuff selected for shipment. That is how the recent Thomas Drumheller shipment to Chicago was able to obtain the top market price; every lamb was to quality. In following this practice, quite an added revenue for lambs is in sight and with this obtained, a profitable season for sheep men seems to be assured.

HOW TO KEEP YOUR TEMPER AND YOUR HEALTH THIS SUMMER

You can keep your temper and your health this summer by dressing sensibly and eating properly. Mid summer comfort is largely a matter of the right sort of food and the right kind of clothing, and those living north of the Mason and Dixon line can take a suggestion from our brothers living on the other side.

Nature, the great specialist. No tightly woven, scoldens, but cool, loosely woven clothing which permits the escape of body heat. And notice the colors! Mostly all light to reflect the heat, not absorb it. All this dressing the part business is important for summer well being. It's really giving nature a chance. Not always have doctors any more than lay people, understood the full significance of the value of such assistance.

There was a time, not so many years ago, when even doctors believed there was a mysterious something in high temperature that made the tropics unhealthful for white men. Then in 1897 Dr. Hammon, a famous English physician, publicly stated that in his opinion it was not the heat that killed the white man in the tropics but the parasites that attacked and conquered him. Ten years later Dr. Hammon visited General Gorgas in Panama, where, with Gorgas' hygiene, science, and sanitation, the canal was being built. And General Gorgas spread out his records for the famous Englishman and said: "Here is proof you are right."

The records showed that the terrible death rate, one out of three every year, which had persisted while the French were attempting to dig the canal no longer prevailed. And a few years later Gorgas was able to point to the health record and show that the death rate was lower than it was for the United States. And this in a country of tropical rain-forest and tropical heat.

People who want to be healthy in summer should dress for comfort and common sense. Light-weight, loosely woven clothing, preferably light in color, is best. As for diet, omit the heavier meats, fats, and supply of purely foods commonly eaten in cooler weather. Instead, eat things sparingly and eat generously of vegetables and fruit. Proper food, proper clothing, exercise and play in the open and adequate sleep will keep the normal person fit the whole summer through. The benefits will help to carry you through the trying winter ahead.

Cherry Producers Get Record Price

PORTLAND (Special)—Cherry growers of the Willamette valley will get more for their fruit this year than was ever before paid in the valley, according to L. W. Wells of Young and Wells, produce shippers, who have contracted for one-half of the total cherry tonnage of the valley.

"The cherry crop will run about 75 per cent of last year's" said Mr. Wells. "Picking of Royal Anna will start on July 1 or 2. Bing on July 6 and Lambert on July 8. The crop of the northwest this year will be practically all from the Willamette Valley. The Dakota has a very small crop. There is none at Lewiston or in the lower part of the Yakima valley. Washington has approximately 100 cars against 175 last year."

"Our company has contracted for the cherry crop of the McMinnville growers association, the Berry Growers Packing company, of Gresham and the three large orchards of Eugene, the latter with about 100 tons. A canvass of the valley shows that practically all the orchards are under contract. Market conditions now are very favorable."

The firm of Young and Wells shipped 112 cars of cherries last year and will send about 80 cars out of the valley this year. The company has packing plants at McMinnville, Eugene, Gresham and Salem and is engaged in the year round shipping of fruits and vegetables to other markets. The cherries are nearly all forwarded to the eastern markets, the sales being handled out of the firm's Chicago office. This year the cherries will be put out in paper-
