Extra and medium grade eggs
are a cent lower today on the ex-
change. Other grades are un-
changed. Butter quotations re-
main unchanged. A total of 3800
pounds of butter and 150 cases of
eggs were moved into storage yester-
day.

a few days by high water condi-
tions.

**Will Give Agents

Dull Trading On Street Follows A Recuperation

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—
The stock market gave another
good demonstration of recupera-
tive power today after yesterday's
late break but trading turned dull
on the early. Pool operations went
more than a dozen issues to new
high levels for the year.

General Motors, Mack Trucks
and Hudson, which were freely
traded yesterday, came back in im-
pressive fashion. General Motors
and Mack came up nearly five
points to a new peak on talk of a
higher dividend. St. Paul com-
mon and Kansas City Southern
moved into new high ground and
Texas and Pacific was bid up
about 2 points.

The closing was steady. Am-
erican Copper dropped to 42 1/2 and
Electric Refrigeration to 18, new
highmarks for the year, while
Youngstown Sheet and Tube
dropped to around 82, also a new
1927 low. Reading forced East-
man Kodak down from an all-
time high of 167 to around 150. Es-
sential, however, continued
to respond to expanded earnings.
Adams and American getting 50
points each and American Rail-
way Express 3 1/2. International

Steel closed at 150, a new high
for the year. Total sales approx-
imated 1,500,000 shares.
