## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Bantelope, cereal cooked with dates, cream spinach with poached eggs on toast, milk, coffee.  
**LUNCHEON**—Baked green beans, cottage cheese sandwiches, black cherry pudding, milk, tea.  
**DINNER**—Baked fresh mackerel, new potatoes in parsley butter, lent greens with onion sauce, cucumber and lettuce salad, sliced fresh pineapple, oatmeal kaiser, rye bread, milk, coffee.

Children under six years of age should not be served cantaloupe for breakfast. A dish of stewed fruit or glass of orange juice should be planned for them.

Black cherry pudding is truly delicious and uses the black sweet cherries to advantage.

**Black Cherry Pudding**  
One cup milk, 1 cup cream, 5 tablespoons butter, 2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon powdered cloves, 4 eggs, 1 cup sifted dried bread crumbs, 1 quart black cherries.

Heat milk and cream and add butter. Beat yolks of eggs well with sugar, spices and lemon rind. Slowly add hot milk mixture, stirring to dissolve sugar. Add crumbs and cherries with pits removed. Mix well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered baking dish. Place on several thicknesses of paper in a pan of hot water, letting water come half way up the dish. Bake in a moderate oven until firm to the touch, about 40 minutes. Serve with slightly sweetened whipped cream.

PARIS (AP)—Beauty in dogs is no longer merely "bark-deep," since Mlle. de Kressler, 18 year old Russian refugee, has opened a day nursery and beauty parlor for canines in Paris.

Mlle. de Kressler has organized her work in professional fashion. Situated in the Aubertin section, it is one of the best known of its kind in Europe. Apartments of London from big German police fellows down to Mexican hairless dogs know her parlors as a place to get a bath, skin treatment or a brushing and combing. Hair cutting is done at the de Kressler salons, but only the French poodles go to for this service to any extent, and they are said by dog fanciers to be vanishing.

No barrier ever studied his canines to better advantage than Mlle. de Kressler studies her canine clients. Even the "bone-man dog" like her and submit themselves to her skilled hands.

The popularity of this business was not established overnight. Its young owner began by taking dogs for a walk. Then she extended the service to parking them at her own house when their mistress were out of Paris. From that she branched into hair-cutting, beautifying and manhandling.

### CRINALYSIS REVEALS EARLY SYMPTOMS

There are several diseases of the urinary tract, that is, of the external canal, bladder, the narrow tubes going from the bladder to the kidney, and the kidney that, if recognized early, would save the patient much suffering and also death. One of the signs which call for immediate consultation with the medical adviser is treatment or abnormal passing of urine, which is red or smoky in color, or is slimy, whether or not accompanied by fever.

The examination of the urine determines whether blood or pus is present, and also reveals the presence of a chronic Bright's disease. Also which part of the tract is diseased can be determined by the elements in the urine when placed under the microscope.

By a proper cystoscopic examination (which means actually looking into the bladder) and with the assistants of the x-ray, we can outline exactly the location of the disease. This can and should be done before any serious symptoms arise.

Tuberculosis of one kidney, which is distinctly a curable condition, can be diagnosed by the above method. To make it curable, the examination, diagnosis, and removal of the kidney must be done early in the disease.

Again, cancer of the tract in its early stages shows only blood in the urine with few little or no pain accompanying urination. Too frequent passage of urine may or may not be present, depending upon the location of the growth. This dreaded disease absolutely needs a very early diagnosis to permit curative removal.

Heeding these warnings and

seeking competent advice is the best means of getting the serious diseases of the urinary tract within the curable period.

Pain in the back has been explicated as the sign important to the recognition of kidney or bladder disease. It is well to have the urine examined for this, but pain in the back is present in less than 40 per cent of kidney cases. Therefore do not wait for this sign.
