

STUDIES "COAL" FOUND IN COUNTY

University of Oregon Geologist Investigates Mineral Deposit.

JOSEPH—On the first of his trips to outlying points of interest in the county, Prof. W. D. Smith drove to Paradise and Lost Prairie to investigate the deposits of primitive coal found there.

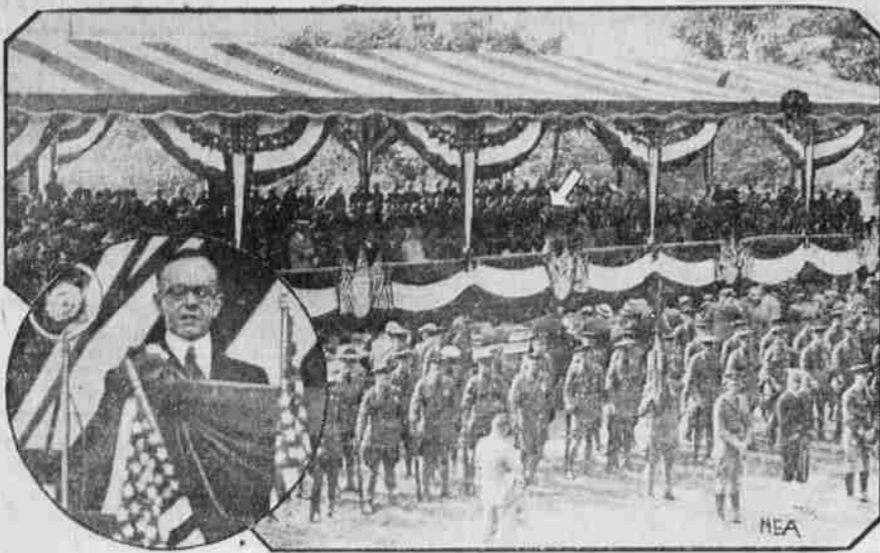
Prof. Smith went with H. L. Forsythe and was accompanied also by D. B. Reavis and Sylvester H. Burleigh. For years the north end deposits have interested residents of the county who were much pleased with the opportunity of showing them in a trained geologist.

In a day or so Prof. Smith will go to Zumwalt to study the ground where indications of oil have been observed for years. An oily fluid, heavy and dark, has exuded from a broken rock formation and has formed a film over springs nearby.

When Prof. Smith has finished his study of the county he will report to the state geologist. It is suggested by laymen that the rock may be the oil bearing shale reported in other districts.

The students, under the guidance of Prof. Smith and his assistant, Manuel Souza, have been making a detailed topographic survey of the moraine which includes Wal-
