## The Garden

**POLE LIMAS FOR SMALL GARDENS**

More pole limas would be grown in home gardens if the owners knew just where to get poles. Almost any good carpenter shop can turn them out on order, each square and six feet long, pointed at one end. These are an investment that will last for a number of seasons if taken in and stored when the bean season is over. Plant the poles first and the beans around them. Four beans to a pole in safe prescription, one on each side of the pole and about an inch and a half from it. If all four germinate, remove two.

The germination of lima beans is proverbially uncertain. They must be planted almost on the surface of the soil in order to have any chance to get up when planted flat.

For the small home garden the pole lima is by far the more practical kind to grow as it gives so much more beans in proportion to the space it occupies than the bush lima. With the poles five feet above ground, the tops may be connected with strong cord and the beans started across to make the gathering easy.

Limas like warm soil with plenty of fertilizer and a good supply of moisture. Keep a dust mulch about them by hoeing in hot, dry spells. They do their sprouting when the soil is at its hottest. If long continued drought sets in, remove the nozzle from the hose and let a slow stream trickle among the bean roots and sink into the soil, soaking thoroughly. Do not sprinkle.

It is an easy matter to raise a copious supply of limas by planting a dozen poles. Set them three feet apart each way in the small garden. Don't forget to sink the bean roots and sink into the soil, soaking thoroughly. Do not sprinkle.

## PLACE ESTIMATE ON WHEAT CROP

PENDELTON—Umatilla county's wheat crop for this year is estimated at six million bushels by Henry Collins, Pendleton grain man, who for a number of years has made remarkably accurate predictions regarding the crop. Last year the crop was five and a quarter million bushels.

"The rain this season has done a wonderful amount of good," says Mr. Collins. "Recently I visited Sherman, Gillman and Wasco counties and their crops will be the best in 10 years. They expect to begin harvesting about July 1. In this county, harvest in the west end will probably begin July 10 and will be general by July 20."

Umatilla county's biggest crop was 7,000,000 bushels, produced about a decade ago. The smallest crop was three and a quarter million bushels, the total in the year 1909.

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## Skaggs Stores To Celebrate 1st Anniversary

OAKLAND, Cal., June 28.—The Skaggs-Safeway stores are holding their first anniversary celebration this week in honor of the formation of what is said to be the west's largest food concern. According to executives of the concern, this event is being celebrated throughout the entire organization from Canada to Mexico, and Nebraska to the Pacific coast. Extensive merchandising preparations had to have been made and various features are to be included in to mark the passing of the first year of their operations since the amalgamation of Skaggs Stores and Safeway Stores into one concern.

Commenting upon results of the merger which occurred July 1st, 1926, executives of the concern stated that these had exceeded their most optimistic hopes. It is said that in the year which has elapsed, operations have been extended to the extreme eastern border of the state of Nebraska and plans have been formulated which contemplate an early opening of the states of Kansas and New Mexico. It is claimed that the annual volume of sales has increased from approximately \$50,000,000 to about \$75,000,000 during the period since the merger. Executives state that approximately one hundred new retail units have been opened which brings the total of such units in operation now in excess of 1000. Many benefits, both to the public and to the firm itself, are said to have accrued from the move which resulted in this merger, and it is claimed that additional advantages will be developed as the vast organization is brought more nearly to perfect coordination.

News of this merger was first given to the general public during October of 1926 and created a great deal of interest and comment in the business world as well as among consumers who were vitally concerned with the economical distribution of food stuffs. Executives of the organization express themselves as being immensely pleased with the things which the consolidation has made it possible for them to accomplish, and which they doubt would have been possible without it.
