Home run hitting de luxe by the big muscled Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig had the New York Yankees further than ever ahead of the American League pack today. No. 25 for both Ruth and Lou came in the same game yesterday and went a long way to help the Yanks to win, 13 to 6 from the Red Sox.

In second place, with the White Sox third, the Washington Senators clinched the contender position by downing the Athletics for the second time in two days, 6 to 5.

Tigers Thriving
Another rising threat appeared in the Detroit Tigers who were in fifth place but only a jump or two behind the White Sox and Athletics. The Indians crack pitcher, George Uhle, again proved no puzzle to the Tigers as they won from him, 6 to 5, for the fifth time this season.

At Thomas' tight pitching kept the White Sox in the running with a 2 to 1 victory over the Browns.

National league clubs succeeded in getting exactly nowhere although two games were played in that circuit, the Giants and Braves breaking even in a double header. Scoring five runs in each of the last two innings, the Giants won the second game 11 to 6, after losing the first by 6 to 1.

TO STOCK LAKES IN WALLOWA CO.

Half Million Fish Will Be Planted, Game Warden Rogers Reports

WALLOWA, Ore., July 1—Practically every lake in Wallowa county in the high mountains, means of course those accessible to pack horses, will be restocked with speckle brook trout this summer, according to George Rogers, county game warden. A total of 500,000 of these trout are now being raised in the ponds at Enterprise for this purpose.

The lakes thus to be stocked include Minam, Mirror, Moccasin, Hornshoe, Douglas, Glacier, Anson, Ice Lake, Pine Lake, and Chimney. Last year and this year were stocked last year. One of those, Francis, however, together with Swamp Lake and Wood Lake, are closed to fishing.

Work of restocking under direction of Mr. Rogers, will begin as soon as possible. The fish will be carried on pack horses in milk cans, two cans to a horse.

Mr. Rogers also has placed an order with the state game and fish commission for more fresh water shrimp, some of which were tried out in Anroid last summer as an experiment in supplying the lake fish with food. The experiment proved successful, the bottles of the fish caught at Anroid recently showing they were making good use of the shrimp as food. The shrimp come from a commercial hatchery in Montana. They are especially valuable in winter time as food when the lakes are frozen over and the trout cannot come to the surface to catch gnats and flies.
