Baker Couple Take Wedding Vows Here

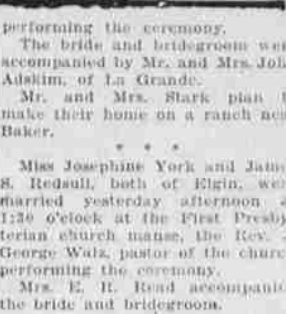

MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—French pineapple, ham omelet, radishes, Graham muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Crab flake and tomato salad, toasted muffins, strawberry pie, cocoa.

DINNER—Broiled sirloin steak, mashed potatoes, French fried onions, omelette, sautéed steamed bananas in orange jelly with whipped cream, white cake, milk, coffee.

A separate luncheon must be planned for children under five years of age. A plain tomato and lettuce salad with plenty of olive oil, toasted muffins, cocoa and strawberries with sugar and cream and a plain cookie can be augmented by a hot soup if necessary. This provides a nourishing noon-day meal.

Strawberry Pie
One quart strawberries, 1 cup granulated sugar, 2 teaspoons butter, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, white 1 egg, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, baked pie shell.

Wash and hull berries. Sprinkle with sugar and let stand one hour. Drain off juice. Heat juice to the boiling point, add butter and cornstarch dissolved in enough cold water to pour. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Add to berries, mixing lightly and let stand until cold. Turn into pie shell and cover with white of egg beaten until stiff and dry with 1 tablespoon cold water. Fold in powdered sugar when white is stiff. Bake eight minutes in a moderate oven to brown and puff the meringue.
