Some British producers say English types do not photograph well. The actresses blame the situation on poor direction and unsatisfactory technique of photography.

LILACS 231 YEARS OLD
STRAFORD, Conn. (AP)—A lone lilac hedge which may well have been the mother of most of the lilacs of this country was cut here recently by a new owner who saw possibilities of profit in a corner lot. Every spring it was a place of bloom and fragrance. Shouts had been carried away from it for more than a hundred years.
Research in town history showed that the hedge was planted in 1696 by the Rev. Samuel Johnson, who brought the shrubs from his native town of Stratford, Conn. In the 231 years of its existence the hedge had attained a height of more than nine feet, despite the yearly cuttings.
