Sunday Services To Commemorate Independence Day

Patriotic Sermons Will Feature Sunday Church Programs in Remembrance of July 4.

Patriotic services, commemorating the independence day, will be held in most of the churches of the city tomorrow morning, Monday, the following day being July 4.

English Lutheran Church. Independence day will be observed in both the Sunday school and church at the English Lutheran church. A talk will be given to the Sunday school on the subject "The Father of our Country in History," which will begin at 9:45 o'clock. During the regular morning hour of worship at 11 o'clock the Rev. H. Aves, pastor of the church, will speak on the subject "The Heritage of a Nation's Strength and Permanence."

First Presbyterian Church. "Our Independence" will be the subject on which the Rev. J. George Wala, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will speak Sunday morning during the regular 11 o'clock worship hour. The service will be filled with patriotic thoughts, the pastor announcing Mrs. Florence Lanch Miller will play a violin solo, as a part of the morning's musical program.

The Bible school will meet at 9:45 o'clock, and the senior class at 10:15 o'clock. There will be no meeting of the Junior or Intermediate Christian Endeavor societies.

First M. E. Church. E. Russell Scott, business executive of the Eastern Oregon Telephone Co., will be the speaker at the First M. E. church, which will hold its Sunday service at 11 o'clock. The subject of the service is "God." Sunday school meets at 9:45 o'clock. Wednesday evening meetings, which include the discussion of hearing, begin at 8 o'clock. The public is invited to attend the services. The reading room in the West-Jackson building, corner of Adams and Elm streets, is open every day from 12 o'clock until 4:20.

Church of God. Sunday school opens at 10 o'clock, and preaching begins at 11. The Rev. Nelson Knuth will be the speaker. The young people and children's meetings are at 7 o'clock. The evening church services begin at 8 o'clock. The Rev. G. L. Burgess, of Woodburn, Ore., will be the speaker. Prayer meeting is held every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

Island City Community Church. The Rev. H. H. Wallis, pastor of the Island City Community church, will exchange pulpits Sunday with the Rev. Mr. Grieson, of Enterprise, who will speak at the Island City church during the morning worship hour at 11 o'clock. The young people of the church will have a patriotic meeting at 7 o'clock in the evening with Miss Wilma Schneider as leader. The Sunday school meets at 9 o'clock.

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Naval Round the World Flight To Be Recommended

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—A naval round-the-world flight following the equator has been recommended to Secretary William of the navy and he is considering its feasibility.

The secretary said today he considered that such a flight would be of greater practical value than any other proposed naval flight. It would offer greater scientific possibilities, he believed, and would do more for the encouragement of aviation than the polar adventure.

ATTACKS AL SMITH. NEW YORK, July 2 (AP)—The New York Times and the Herald-Tribune today say Senator J. Thomas Heflin, democrat of Alabama, last night attacked Governor Alfred E. Smith as a presidential candidate in a two-hour address at a banquet in Richmond, Va., which is in the city limits.

The meeting was attended by 2,000 men who had been invited by the United Producers' alliance of Quebec, the newspaper says. When the chairman asked all Ku Klux Klansmen to arise almost every one in the audience stood up. Applaudments for membership in the Klan were distributed.

For advocating a cut in the corporation tax from 12 to 10, as low as 10 per cent and also a cut in the personal income tax in the higher brackets.

The lower brackets, he held, need no further reduction at present, but he believed that the "missile tax" would be abandoned entirely.

BOHRA SPEAKS

BOHRA, Ind., July 2 (AP)—Senator William E. Borah, at his home here for a vacation, gave the Associated Press a brief statement yesterday on the 1928 political outlook in which he named President Coolidge as the probable Republican standard bearer and Governor Alfred E. Smith, of New York, and Senator James A. Reed, of Missouri, as "most discussed" for the democratic nomination.

Senator Borah's complete statement follows:

"The opinion seems to prevail as I find it in crossing the country that President Coolidge will be re-nominated. Unless President Coolidge signifies his wishes to the contrary I am of the opinion this party will renominate him."

"The two men who are most discussed for the democratic nomination are Governor Smith, of New York, and Senator Reed, of Missouri. I would say that Governor Smith is very strong in the east and Senator Reed is very popular in the west and south, so that ought to make a good race."
