Find Fingerprint: The first tangible clue as to the identity of the girl's slayer was discovered yesterday by police in the form of a blood-stained fingerprint on the green-handled fire escape which she was slain. Chief of Detectives R. A. Wolfman characterized the print as one made by a woman's hand or by that of a man with elongated, tapering fingers. This is in accord with one of the two theories entertained by officials—that the girl was the victim of a jealous woman. This, however, is considered improbable by W. G. Hens view of the fact that nothing has been discovered to indicate that she had incurred the jealousy of a woman. Hens is more inclined to accept the theory that the girl's attacker was a degenerate, or a group of degenerates, pointing out that every element of the crime can thus be accounted for.

SEEK FOR YOUTH IN MURDER CASE: OAKLAND, July 5 (AP)—Police today began an intensive search for Frank Pannone, 17, for questioning in connection with the murder of Mabel Mayer, 16-year-old school girl whose body was found in a yard back of a vacant home here early today. She had been beaten to death with clubs.

17-Year-Old Linked with Murder of Mabel Mayer in Oakland Sunday: Search for Pannone followed the questioning of five boys, whose conversation at the Fourth of July fireworks display led bystanders to call the police in the belief that they knew something of the murder. A brother of the hunted youth said Frank accounted for a scratch on his face by saying he fell from an automobile. Police said Pannone was a habitue of a pool hall near the Mayer home.
