**Open Combination Sandwiches**  
 Two cups canned tomatoes, 1 cup grated cheese, 1 cup finely chopped cold boiled ham, 1 tablespoon grated onion, 1 sweet green pepper, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 4 eggs, 1 square hot buttered toast.

Put tomatoes through a strainer. Remove seeds and add green pepper and parboiled five minutes. Rub off thin outer covering. Cut flesh in thin strips. Combine tomato pulp, grated cheese, ham, onion, pepper and herbs. Bring to the boiling point over a low fire. Do not let boil. Add butter and cook slightly beaten and stir and cook by the side of the fire until the eggs are set. Serve at once on hot buttered toast.

WALLOWA, Ore., July 6 (Special)—Weather conditions in this county have been more or less rainy during the greater part of the past week and one or more hard rain have fallen which appear to have resulted in most parts of the county, except fitting the soil with moisture. In a few instances some damage is reported by farmers from some of the heavy winter wheat being lodged by the rain and wind. A number of farmers along the valley section had also cut a considerable amount of hay recently and this was badly wet and is requiring considerable work to get it in shape for proper curing out.

Crops of all kinds continue to make a rapid growth, and about now is whether the continued stormy period will result in harvest. Many farmers have been busy the last week getting their winter-planted fields cultivated, and cleaning the weeds out of gardens, etc.
