NEW RESIDENCE WILL BE ERECTED

Permits Issued for New Construction During Week Total \$3198

Although a number of permits were issued during the past week, June 27 to July 2, inclusive, most were for small construction jobs.

One new dwelling place was started, a one and a half story stucco home on N avenue between Sixth and Seventh streets.

Total permits issued for the week were \$3,198.

The permits follow:

June 28—Ray Goodenough, to erect a one and one-half story stucco home on N between Sixth and Seventh, to cost \$2,500.

June 28—Harvey Foster Advertising company, to erect a poster board on Fourth between Jefferson and Adams to cost \$18.

June 28—Harvey Foster Advertising company, to erect a billboard on Monroe between Greenwood and Fir, to cost \$50.

July 1—H. P. Nelson, to alter and repair a two-story movie theater on Adams between Fourth and Depot, work to cost \$600. Theater owned by N. K. West and Siegrist.

July 2—W. F. Gallagher, to erect a garage on Depot between W and N, to cost \$50.

July 2—R. D. Kneut, to erect a rabbit house on Cove between Pennsylvania and Cherry, to cost \$24.

Walla Walla Half Year Mark \$135,000

WALLA WALLA, July 4—New building operations in Walla Walla for the first six months of the year reached the substantial total of over \$135,000, according to figures obtained from the city building inspectors' books recently. There was no permit during that period for over \$25,000 so that the total represents considerable, scattered construction work of the residential and business improvement character that materially adds to the growth of the community.

Electric Age Is Dawning in Farms Over the Nation

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—The age of electricity is dawning rapidly on the farm.

Four years ago the University of Minnesota established the first rural electrification project in the nation at Red Wing, Minn. Today there are 25 such projects in as many states, all experimenting with application of electric energy to the tasks of agriculture.

Partners in more than a score of states, says Prof. E. A. Stewart, supervisor of the Red Wing station, are using electricity to operate threshing machines, ensilage cutters, pumps, hay lifts, barn ventilators, feed grinders, milking machines, saws, grain cleaners, root cutters and refrigerators, as well as household devices.

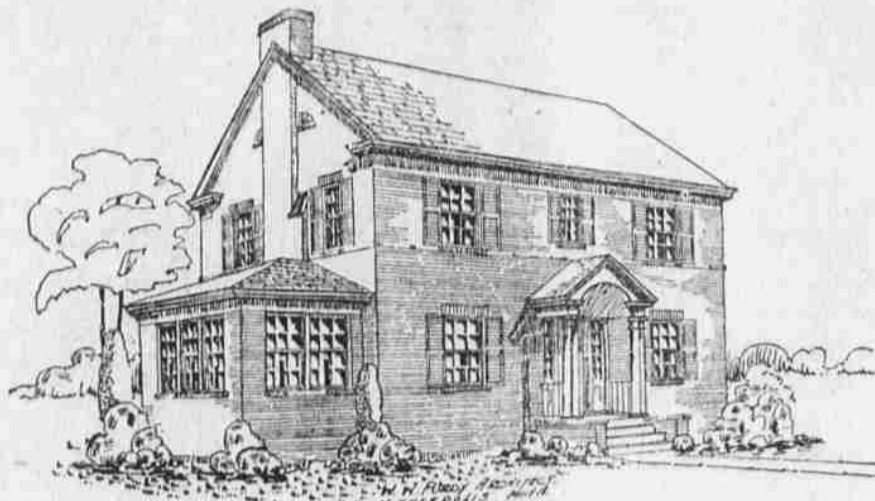
Outstanding developments, Stewart says, are the successful application of electrical power to dairy barn ventilation, to dairy refrigeration and to poultry raising.

Refrigeration is becoming a vital problem on dairy farms, Stewart points out. Until lately the farmer could refrigerate his products by putting them into a well or the bottom of a well rope. But now dairymen are becoming a big business—it earned the \$200,000,000 mark last year in Minnesota—and more elaborate cooling systems are demanded. Engineers at the Red Wing station are working on a refrigerator designed exclusively for farm use.

Minnesota poultry farms doing annual businesses approximating \$100,000 are experimenting with electrical devices, according to Stewart, and have already found that electrically heated incubators produce high percentage hatchings of well-developed chicks, and that the electric lighting of poultry houses during the winter increases egg production by four or five eggs a month for each hen.

A BRICK VENEER COLONIAL

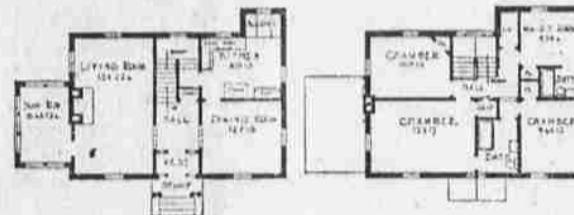
It is very difficult to find a more pleasing plan and exterior than the New England Colonial. The plan shows a very complete home of four bed rooms, and two baths. The rooms could not be called large, but are of sufficient size to accommodate a family of five or six. The sun room, placed on the side, gives breadth to the home, planned for an east facing, this room gets the sun almost the entire day.

Note the convenient kitchen, the breakfast alcove, the large owner's chamber with direct access to bath, as well as the maid's room, and private bath. If desired, a fireplace could be added, in either of the chambers, or in the sun room of the first floor, at a small additional cost.

The floors are oak, waxed, the trim pine, enameled with stained mahogany doors. Baths in tile, linoleum in the kitchen.

The exterior walls are frame construction using a veneer of red colonial brick on the outside. This eliminates the excessive cost of painting, makes for a warmer construction, and the cost is only about \$250 to \$300 more, depending on the brick used. Green stained shingles are used on the roof, trim painted white, with green shutters.

With full basement, laundry, storage room, vegetable room, etc., it is estimated that this home can be built for from \$7,500 to \$8,500, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

Sales Record of Oil Burners Is Outstanding One

CHICAGO, July 4—Oil burner sales have grown so fast in the past ten years that they have far outdistanced the record of the automobile industry in the first ten years of its existence, according to figures presented to a meeting of oil burner dealers here by E. L. Williams, president of the Williams Oil-O-Matic Heating corporation of Bloomington, Ill.

"Few persons realize the amazing growth of the industry, which built and installed 100,000 burners last year and will build and install 250,000 this year, based on the more reliable estimates," said Mr. Williams.

"Six times as much money was invested for oil burners in the tenth year of the industry as was spent for automobiles in the tenth year of that industry. More than \$75,000,000 was invested in oil burning equipment in the tenth year of our industry, but in the corresponding year of the automobile industry only \$12,000,000 of motor cars were sold in the United States."

More than a half-million American families live in oil-burner equipped homes, said Mr. Williams.

The Garden

BRILLIANT ANNUAL PHLOX

Annual phlox offer one of the most brilliant garden materials for midsummer and they are one of the quickest annuals to come into bloom from seed, making them excellent material for sowing up to midsummer. Phlox Drummondii, as it is known botanically, originally a native of Texas, in the hands of the skilled plant breeders of Europe has been developed into a wonderful array of colors and forms.

The rich glowing scarlets and crimsons with the equally fine purples are favorite types while there is a wide series of the delicate shades of pink and rose with eyes and edgings of white. There is also a creamy yellow form of delicate beauty.

In addition to the regular forms in both small and large-flowering forms, types of star shapes and with washed corollas have been developed. Seed of phlox Drummondii may be sown any time until midsummer. It is best to sow the seed thinly where it is to remain and then thin out the plants

to six inches apart. It sprouts up to bloom quickly and then branches freely, each branch terminating in a cluster of bloom.

It is not particular as to soil but requires sunlight. Care should be taken to keep the fading flower clusters clipped off so that the plant will not run to seed as this terminates its blooming career. Attention to this detail will prolong its season materially.

Masses of a single color such as the crimson and scarlets are very effective and lend themselves to color schemes admirably. It is also one of the annuals that lends itself admirably to being planted in mixed varieties, such a bed offering a bewildering array of color and markings. This oil-burned annual in its newer dress is becoming one of the most popular of midsummer bedding plants and deserves so far there is no other annual that makes a finer low-growing solid sheet of color. It is also useful for cutting in mixed bouquets, "garden bouquets" as they are now called.

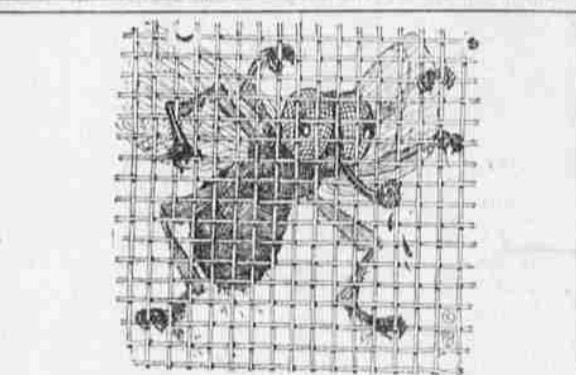
