MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Stewed Phurber, cereal, cream, codfish puffs, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Roast beef, toast, apples, tomato and sardine salad, rye bread, caramel cookies, milk tea.

DINNER—Veal rolls, baked macaroni and tomatoes, asparagus in sauce, cherry salad, raspberry shortcake, milk, coffee.

If we would remember that green salads are better than cosmetics for our complexions, we would persist in "a salad a day". More than this, we would not leave the lettuce on the salad plate when tomatoes or some other vegetable makes the salad. Lettuce is rich in vitamin A, B and C and is one of the ever-ready salad greens.

Tomato and Sardine Salad
Four tomatoes, 5 small sardines, 5 stuffed olives, 4 tablespoons minced celery, 1 sweet green pepper, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, mayonnaise, lettuce.

Peel tomatoes and scoop out seeds.

Put tomato inside with salt and lettuce on a plate. Chill. Strain tomato pulp. Chop olives. Remove seeds and pith from pepper and mince. Mix, combine celery, olives, pepper and parsley with tomato juice. Season with a few grains of sugar and salt. Fill tomatoes with mixture. Mask with mayonnaise and place 2 sardines at right angles to each other on top of each tomato. Serve on a bed of lettuce.

15,108 Carloads of Apples in Year

WENATCHEE, Wash., July 5.—A total apple crop of 15,108 cars is forecast by District Inspector George E. Harter and V. G. Pizman for north central Washington this year, compared with actual shipments of 17,512 for last year's crop.

In the comparison of shipments for last year's crop with the estimated yield of this year, there is a slight discrepancy, as complete figures from all the stations had not been received, hence only 17,377 cars are reported, about 135 less than the actual movement.

Last year the two inspectors estimated the crop at 15,134, or about 600 cars above actual shipments. Two years ago the July estimate was below the actual shipments by about 6 per cent. In making crop estimates, a variation of 10 per cent either way is usually allowed for changes in climatic conditions, frosts, winds and hail damage.

Farm Pointers

Electric motors are replacing other sources of power for driving the fans because of greater uniformity of power and lower costs for labor and repairs. Electricity is also used for light and power to operate oil burners, water pumps, traying machines, graders, and washers in dehydration. Also where available for driving apparatus by reason of satisfactory operation and low cost.

Increased prune consumption is to be worked for through a standardized high quality, reasonable price to consumers, better preparation for sale, and advertising and demonstration. No further planting is advised until a program for increased consumption is under way.

Legumes and grass seed are recommended for increased acreage in the Willamette valley and in irrigated districts remote from railroads. Production and sale of such seeds as eye grass, orchard grass, tall oat grass, red-top, and creeping bent grass may well be increased to the value of a million dollars a year.

The dusting sulphur treatment will be used extensively in prevention of royer mildew, reports the Oregon experiment station. In most cases the sulphur is applied shortly after the first mowing.

Shows Increase Of Idaho's Peas

BOISE, Ida., July 5.—Development of the green or fresh pea industry in Idaho this year, made profitable by the high moisture content of Idaho lands, a condition created by good precipitation, is indicated in the June report of refrigerator car shipments from southern Idaho points on the Oregon Short Line railroad, as filed Tuesday with the public utilities commission by the Pacific Fruit Express company. Fourteen cars of green peas were moved to markets during the past month.

Other leading shipments of the last month were 65 cars of butter, 38 cars of cheese, 28 cars of eggs, 25 cars of lettuce, and 18 cars of canned goods. Shipments of perishable freight totaled 223 cars during the month, thus bringing the six months' total to 8822 cars as compared with 318 cars in June, 1926, and 12,139 cars during the six months' period of 1926.
