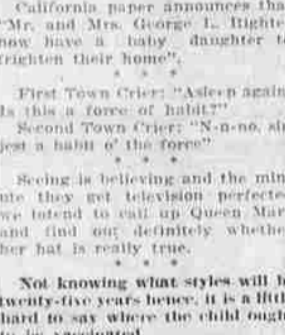

"Understanding Heart" Is Romantic Drama

A romantic drama so real, the onlooker can almost feel the soul mountain breezes or the searching forest fire that surrounds Bruns' work. "The Understanding Heart," the cosmopolitan production of Peter B. Kyne's popular novel, which had its first showing in La Grande last night at the Star theater, where it opened a three-day run.

Seldom can the spectator of a motion picture forget that he is seeing only shadows, but "The Understanding Heart" is so alluringly thrilling that one is swept away in the current of emotions that leads to a smashing, powerful climax that left the audience breathless at last night's showing.

The story concerns Monica Dale, played by Joan Crawford, daughter of a forest ranger. On the death of her father, Monica takes charge of the lookout station on Bonus peak, the picturesque location that serves as a focal point for the entire drama. Thru a thousand feet above the surrounding country, and with only one avenue of approach, Bonus peak and Monica are like symbols of strength and authority.

Francis X. Bushman Jr. is seen in the part of Tony, the young forest ranger. If this is evidence of the kind of work the young man can do, it looks as if he would repeat family history.

Charles Myers relies far more upon genuine acting than upon personal appeal as Keely, the unfaithful wife of Bob Mason, who Monica "understands".

The always clever Rochelle Fellows has nothing to be desired in his portrayal of Bob Mason and Jerry Miley, a newcomer to pictures, is sufficiently the cool as Bardwell. Much original and genuinely funny comedy is injected by the two old characters, Uncle Charles, played by Harvey Clark, and Sheriff Clem Bentley, who "takes his job" played by Richard Gray, former stage comedian.
