

MARKET STEADY; GAIN HOLDS FAST

Wholesale, Retail Prices in Portland Remain at Yesterday's High

Portland, Ore., July 8 (AP)—Portland wholesale and retail markets were generally steady this morning at Thursday's ruling prices. Country dressed meats and poultry held a moderate trade throughout yesterday with slightly firm quotations leading over for today's opening. Supplies continue moderate. Butter and eggs are firm and steady today with no new egg quotations. Extra cube and standard cube butter are both half cent lower today, following yesterday's daily exchange session. Storage holdings were increased 5,242 cases yesterday. Egg stores here decreased by 100 cases. All lines of fruit and vegetables are plentiful and firm at yesterday's quotations. New northwest onions have come on the market from Pasco and Wells Wells and are priced at from 2 to 3 1/2 cents per pound. Bulkhead potatoes of fair size and excellent condition were offered in small quantities for \$1.50 per bush of about 50 pounds. They were readily taken.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, July 8 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "There is a broader demand for wool and prices are generally firmer, though not quite as high as a few days ago. The tendency of the market however, is definitely against the buyer. Prices in the west are July firm, with demand steady. London has opened with prices approximately 5 per cent above the average than the close of the previous series. All foreign markets are strong, with an upward tendency. The manufacturing position is the most favorable it has been for months, with more or less general buying in moderate quantities. Mohair is steady, with demand still slow. Firm Undertone Noted in Wall Street Trading

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Stock prices displayed a firm undertone today. Professionals sold stock today, but in some cases, they encountered strong supporting orders, and in some cases, they were committed at higher prices by the early afternoon. General activity dipped to low 20s, but strong support appeared in some of the other automotive issues. Jordan Motors, which touched a new low at 35 1/2 only a few days ago, sold above 13 on a revival of interest. Raymond Galt, which had sold above 22, touched a new low at 12 1/2. The closing was irregular, 17 1/2. Rubber, common and preferred, were liquidated in a steady stream despite the declaration of the usual quarterly dividend on the preferred. Paramount, Famous Players and other motion picture issues were included in considerable amounts. Deere-Arrow preferred went to the year's record, but consistent buying forced other shares to new all-time highs. Lambert crossed 30 and Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis at 17 1/2 gained 10 points. Total sales approximately 1,300,000 shares.

Moscow Cherry Crop Is Small; Picking Begins

MOSCOW, Ida., July 8.—Cherry picking is under way in Latah county. The eastern market picking is nearly complete south of here in the Lewiston valley. The Lewiston crop is said to have been virtually negligible. W. H. Young of Young and Wells, fruit distributor of the Inland Empire, disclosed here this week that his firm had shipped only two carloads of cherries from Lewiston this season, whereas 125 carloads were sent to the Atlantic seaboard market a year ago. The Moscow region will not furnish more than five or six carloads, he predicted, whereas a normal picking is two cars. Late frosts virtually wiped out the soft fruits of the north Idaho fruit belt. It was believed at first, however, that only a portion of the cherry crop was injured, but as maturity stage approached, those not killed began dropping. Apriels suffered a similar fate, apples suffered a smaller damage but the crop will be below normal this year.
