13 INDICTMENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8 (AP)—Thirteen indictments involving 18 alleged federal statute violators were returned by the federal grand jury today. One indictment charging violation of the Mann act was secret.

Indictments returned included Harry Melrose and Joseph H. Walker, arrested May 5, charged with transportation of a stolen suit from Montesano, Wash., to Enterprise, Ore.

FORD LIBEL SUIT SETTLEMENT SEEN

Car Maker's Promise to Quit Attack on Jews Brings Results

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Settlement of two libel suits for damages aggregating \$1,200,000 against Henry Ford was seen as a possibility today following the motor manufacturer's promise to discontinue attacks on Jews in his Dearborn Independent.

Samuel Spiro, Chicago attorney and plaintiff in a \$1,000,000 suit against Ford, said negotiations for settlement of the suit were under way, while Louis Marshall, counsel for Herman Bernstein, New York author and editor and plaintiff in another suit said representations of Ford had asked him "what could be done to put an end to these conditions."

May Continue Suit

The New York Herald-Tribune, however, said it had learned on good authority that neither Mr. Bernstein nor Samuel Untermyer, associated with Mr. Marshall as counsel in the suit, was ready to withdraw the action. Mr. Bernstein, of Sheffield, Mass., said: "Henry Ford's statement speaks for itself. I have no comment to make at this time."

And the general opinion by prominent Jews and others that greeted Ford's retraction there was some dissent, centering mainly on speculation by newspapers as to the motives that prompted the statement. Some New York newspapers connected the statement with possible presidential aspirations by Ford or business contingencies.

Ask Governor's Consent To Pick Goose Feathers

SALEM, Ore., July 8 (AP)—Mrs. Frank Rice, of Holley, Ore., writes Governor Patterson to inquire "if there is a law prohibiting picking geese for the feathers for your own use."

"I would like to pick mine if there is no law against it," she adds. The governor has not yet answered the letter, but will probably reply that it is a perfectly legal procedure to pick ones' geese. In fact the governor may be able to say that he has picked a few himself recently.

Meeting To Talk Farm Legislation

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 8 (AP)—Representatives of farmer organizations in several middle western states will meet here next Monday and Tuesday to formulate a plan of action in congress looking to some form of farm legislation.

The meeting will re-affirm the principles of the McNary-Hangen bill passed by the president," said J. E. Reed, president of the Minnesota Farm Bureau Federation.

A WIFE TOO MANY

CHICAGO, July 8 (AP)—After five years of married life, Owen W. Hawley informed his wife that he was leaving for the west to visit his first wife. The second wife, Mrs. Annie M. Hawley, who thought she was his first and only wife, filed suit to annul her marriage.

The other wife is Mrs. Belle Hawley, of Salem, Ore. Mrs. Annie Hawley does not know when the first marriage took place but believes it was before her marriage to Hawley in December, 1922. She met Hawley in France during the war.

LANCASTER, Ont., July 8 (AP)—Don Carrick, youthful Toronto golfer, today won the Canadian amateur golf championship for the second time, defeating Frank Thompson of Chicago 7 up and six to play, in their 24-hole final match. Carrick won the championship for the first time in 1925.

many of the districts and will be in full swing within another three weeks in most sections.

One problem confronting the farmers is the immediate disposition of their wheat. It is said that many of the farmers have insufficient storage facilities and are applying to the railroads for use on which to pile their wheat in the fields until it can be moved.

With the bumper crop, prospects of high prices prevail. Reports are that some sales have already been made for \$1.75 a bushel, with still higher prices expected.

Not only is there prospect of a big wheat crop, but indications are that there will be a large and profitable harvest of other farm crops. The fruit is turning out much better than early reports would indicate, and because of the favorable growing weather, the quality is far above the averages of former years.

RAILROADS READY

RAILROADS, July 8 (AP)—Railroads are making their plans for the movement of bumper crops in the west this year. President Coolidge was told today by a group of railway officials who came to visit him at the summer white house.

To Start Home July 12 From Dallas the aviators will motor to Dunsmuir, where they will be made free citizens of the city, and then to Le Touquet, where a banquet will be given in their honor.

They plan to arrive at Cherbourg Tuesday, to board the Leclaireur that afternoon. It is learned that they will occupy the suite on the liner used by queen Marie of Rumania on her American trip last year.

PAY BROOKS WELL

DALLAS, July 8 (AP)—Maurice Brookins' contract with Charles A. Levine, under which he is to pilot the transatlantic plane Columbia back to America, runs for one year with compensation of \$150,000, the newspaper L'Auro says today.

Expressed in French money, this amounts to 3,750,000 francs, which appears to be rather a stupendous sum to the French public. L'Auro's story has tended to stimulate

rather than quiet the controversy raging over the proposed flight and the newspapers generally criticize both Brookins and Levine.

Condemns Both
L'Auro, which characterizes the pilot's decision as "regrettable," prints a communication from Henry Farman, veteran aviator, who condemns both men. He says he thinks Levine might have chosen a pilot from the large number of efficient men only too willing to go, without trying the man who has been training for his own transatlantic flight.

There are still, however, a certain number of voices in support of Brookins' decision to seek the opportunity which presented itself to get ahead of the German pilot, Koennecke, who is reported to be

straining every nerve to make a westward transatlantic flight.

There is some division of opinion among French fliers and airplane experts as to whether Brookins will succeed in flying the plane to New York and the newspaper L'intransigeant quotes Chamberlin as doubting whether on a westward flight the machine could get farther than Newfoundland, because of contrary winds which are certain to be encountered.
