## McNARY-HAUGEN BILL ENDORSED

### St. Paul Conference Favors Measure or Substitute Along Same Lines

ST. PAUL, July 12 (AP)—Resolutions prepared for submission to the northwestern agricultural conference will include a demand for fullest application of protective tariff to agriculture and enactment into law of the McNary-Haugen bill, or a measure embodying its principles.

The resolutions were prepared by a committee of 29 headed by Congressman Charles Brandt of Ohio. There was no suggestion in addresses at the opening of the conference yesterday for any substitute for the principles of the McNary-Haugen bill. Instead, the session was a continuous reaffirmation of those principles and an insistence that they be put into any remedial legislation.

### Predicts Passage

Congressman Gilbert N. Haugen, of Iowa, co-author of the bill, predicted its passage next winter in both houses of congress and in event of another veto by President Coolidge, its re-passage over that veto.

## JERUSALEM AFRAID

JERUSALEM, July 12 (AP)—The aid city today had the appearance of having passed through a military siege as the result of yesterday's earthquake. The streets were filled with crowds, the people hesitating to enter the houses in fear of a recurrence of the earthquake and possible collapse caused by a weakening of the foundations. As the hours passed, however, a calm atmosphere was returning to the city of peace.

A seismic record of the earthquake, made by seismographic apparatus in Tel Aviv, shows that the earthquake moved from north to south. The Alentejo bridge was damaged at both ends. The Greek catholic church of the holy sepulchre has been declared unsafe because of the cracks in the walls. The roof of the chemical laboratory of the Hebrew university on the Mount of Olives collapsed.

The government House, located on the Mount of Olives was badly damaged. The rooms of the high-commissioner, Lord Plumer and Lady Plumer, who are on vacation in England, were wrecked.

One of three Indian women who were killed in a hotel in Jericho has been identified as the wife of Sir Abdul Raouf. Her companion perished with her.

JERUSALEM, July 12 (AP)—Eighty-five persons are reported killed in yesterday's earthquake at Es-Salt, Palestine in town with a population of about 12,000, and eight at Amman, trans-Jordan.

The clash between the three forces to the republican primary of next spring with definite assurance that at least Hoos and Gabrielson will be candidates for the nomination.

The office of budget commissioner comprises the only major appointment remaining in the governor's hands as it is generally understood that his revamping of the highway commission has been completed with the replacement of Wale Malone by C. E. Gates and William Doby by Robert Sawyer, and that H. B. Van Duzer, of Portland, will remain on the board although he is a democrat.

There is some speculation as to what the governor intends to do with the state fair board, but it is generally believed that he will leave the board as it is until after this year's fair in September.
