Chamberlin On Way Home On The Leviathan

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., July 12 (AP)—Carrying back to the United States his long distance air record on his transatlantic flight from New York to Germany, Clarence D. Chamberlin, accompanied by Mrs. Chamberlin, sailed for home today aboard the steamship Leviathan.

The giant steamship, which promises to become known as "The Axtator's Lane," left her overboard where Commander Richard E. Byrd and his three transatlantic companions of the monoplane America, plan to board the vessel with their plane.

To make the aviation flavor of the voyage even more distinct, Franklin Thes Rasmussen, Germany's only certified licensed pilot, boarded the Leviathan at Southampton with her little stunt plane.

Fire Sweeps Over West Blocton, Ala.

WEST BLOCTON, Ala., July 12 (AP)—Thirty-five business houses and 20 residences had been destroyed at 1:30 p. m. by a disastrous fire that threatened to wipe out this town, 50 miles southwest of Birmingham.

The estimated damage already was \$500,000, and there was no indication when the fire could be brought under control.

Dynamite, used in an effort to combat the flames, served only to spread the fire.

Fire companies from Birmingham and nearby towns arrived to aid the population, numbering 2,500, to fight the flames.

Fatal Day Past So Nations Can Go On In Peace

CHESHAM, Eng., July 12. (AP)—July eleven marked the end of the "spirit of loathing" at Geneva, says the Rev. Walter Wynn, proprietor of the pyramids, recasting his forecast of disaster for that day.

Mr. Wynn, who reads the world's future in the great pyramid at Giza, issued a warning in March to beware of July 11, saying: "An event will take place which will greatly accelerate chaos and cause all the nations of the world to share in intensified preparations for war."

Discussing his prediction today, Mr. Wynn declared that the warning of Kevin O'Higgins in Dublin gave the disarmament conference at Geneva "a glorious diplomatic and welcome chance to adjourn indefinitely, bringing the obvious force to an end." He added: "The nations will now go their own ways, doing their own thinking and making war preparations until May 12, 1928, the next crucial pyramid day."
