## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Cherries, baked fish cakes, creamed potatoes, breakfast radishes, corn muffins, milk, coffee.  
**LUNCHEON**—Spinach delicious, tomatoed muffins, cottage cheese with Barle-Due currants, crackers, milk, tea.  
**DINNER**—Hot veal loaf, green peppers stuffed with rice, asparagus salad, green apple pie, milk, coffee.

**Spinach Delicious**  
 Two pounds of spinach, 1 cup sliced mushrooms, 6 slices bacon, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 cup milk, 2 hard-boiled eggs.  
 Wash and pick over spinach. Cook in its own juice until tender, letting the liquid cook away. Drain and chop. Reserve juice to use in sauce. Brown bacon until crisp. Use 1 tablespoon bacon fat, add sliced mushrooms and cook over a low fire for ten minutes. Put in flour, slowly add milk and spinach juice and cook until mixture boils. Season with salt, pepper and paprika. Arrange spinach in center of deep platter, surround with bacon and pour the sauce over spinach. Garnish with slices of hard-boiled eggs.

Made very hot in the oven before serving with eggs.

## A DEPENDABLE DISH

To make French fried potatoes, peel and cut the potatoes lengthwise into strips about one-half inch thick. Rinse in cool running water and soak for two or three hours in cold water to remove as much starch as possible. Pat with a clean, dry cloth to absorb moisture.

Keep a kettle of deep fat hot enough to brown a small piece of bread in one minute. Fry a cupful of potatoes at a time. Remove from the fat when a golden brown. Drain on clean absorbent paper and sprinkle with salt. Serve at once while hot and crisp.

## The accepted salad etiquette
