MENUS

BREAKFAST—Blackberries, cranberry, creamed dried beef with fresh tomatoes on toast, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Boiled beef's tongue (cold), stuffed cherry salad, brown bread and butter sandwiches, milk, tea.

DINNER—Clam bouillon, salmon croquettes, new peas in cream sauce, jellied pineapple and cabbage salad, her raspberry shortcake, milk, coffee.

If you have never served an old-fashioned red raspberry shortcake you have "something coming to you." A regular baking powder biscuit dough is used for the crust just as in the traditional strawberry cake. Cover the berries with sugar and 1/2 cup orange juice to a quart of berries. Let stand for half an hour while mixing and baking the cake. Split, butter and fill cake with prepared berries and serve with plenty of plain cream. Garnish with whipped cream if you will, but do serve a large pitcher full of just cream.

Brown Bread
One cup whole wheat flour, 2 cups bran, 1 cup sour milk, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup seeded raisins, 1/2 cup broken nut meats, 1/2 cup seeded raisins, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon salt. Beat egg until light. Beat in raisins, nuts and salt. Dissolve soda in milk and add immediately to mixture. Beat well and add bran. Mix thoroughly and turn into a buttered bread pan. Bake one hour in a moderately slow oven. This bread is good for picnic and afternoon tea.

HEALTH

KEEP COOL AND QUIET THIS SUMMER—BEST FOR HEALTH

Member Cosmos Memorial List. Excitement is bad for small infants. Babies suffer from "nervous prostration" just as do adults. Talking should never be allowed in the baby's sleeping room. Visitors, too, often has the same drawbacks for tired grandparents and aunts, in their efforts to show off the children to admiring friends, are responsible for many attacks of indigestion and many a restless night.

In older children, the excitement of parties, with unaccustomed dancing, candy, ice cream, cakes, etc., is often the cause of serious disturbances, especially in a nervous child.

Teething in the second summer is still a dread experience among many young mothers. The cutting of teeth is a normal process and is usually not attended by any danger. In some babies there are certain disturbances which come with teething and seem to be due to that alone. Any ailment that the child has is apt to be aggravated at this time. If a cold, it is worse; if skin eruption, it is more pronounced and harder to cure.

Constipation is very common with these babies. It is important every day—particularly so in hot weather. To secure this result, give the baby its feeding at regular intervals and see that it gets two or three ounces of boiled water at least twice a day—best given one-half hour before feeding. Orange juice has little effect on the bowels, but prune juice, unsweetened, is effective. It should be given in smaller amounts than orange juice. One to four teaspoonsfuls an hour before the morning bottle. Vegetable water, the juice of spinach cooked in a double boiler for 20 minutes without added water, and given at the 2 p. m. feedings, one to eight teaspoonsfuls, is usually most helpful. Changes in diet may be necessary but should only be made under the advice of your physician.

While cutting teeth, the baby may have fever or diarrhea. But it is not safe, as most mothers do, to say that it is only his teeth. These symptoms may be due to causes entirely apart from tooth cutting and require the prompt attention of your doctor.

In general, during teething, especially in the summer time, the baby's resistance is somewhat impaired. His digestion is not so good. His nervous system is less stable. Hence he is more liable to digestive and nervous upsets, so that it is of the utmost importance

CHOICE STRAWBERRY JAM
Wash thoroughly, drain and chop four quarts of strawberries. Blend with the largest fruit. Crush one quart of the smaller berries and add three pounds of sugar.

Cook rapidly in an enameled saucepan and stir until the sugar is dissolved and a thick syrup is formed. Add the remainder of the fruit and continue the rapid cooking, stirring frequently to prevent scorching.

An asbestos mat should be placed under the pan as a precaution.

Cook from 45 minutes to an hour, until fairly thick, then add two to three tablespoons of lemon juice. The jam should then have a brilliant red color, and some of the fresh flavor of the fruit. The jam thickens when cold and should not be cooked down too much. Place the jam in sterilized jars, seal and store.

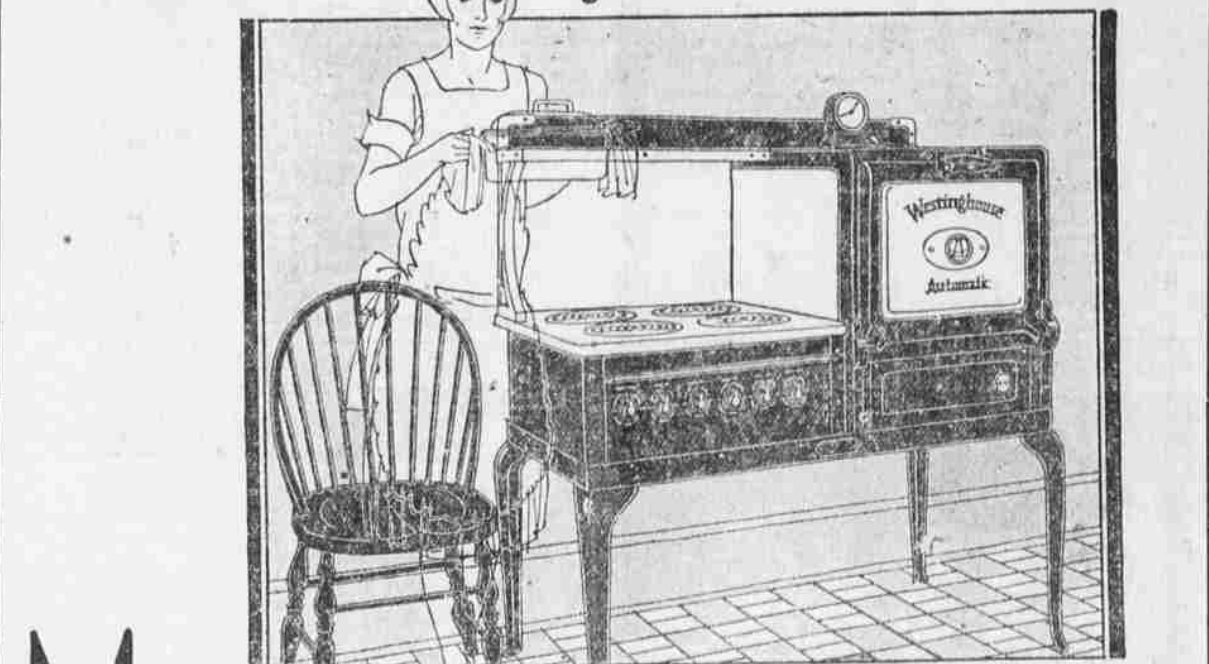
