WALLA WALLA, July 15.—Heads of ridit wheat in some localities six inches long and well filled with wheat berries, are reported from the local field of John Williamson, of Walla Walla. These heads are among the largest ever brought to the attention of A. W. Kistner, county agent, who says that this field is expected to be one of the heaviest yields in the district this year.

Ridit wheat from the San Lowry place, owned by Homer Brown is reported to be shedding at the rate of 15 bushels an acre. This land lies west of Walla Walla where yields of that size are not common.

Threshing is under way on the George Ginn ranch southeast of Walla Walla and the P. M. Smith place was entered by harvesters Wednesday. The return of warm weather has heartened growers who toiled with severe temperatures on the unsettled skies earlier this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Keefe and son, Donald, spent several days in the Plover country this week. George Crooner had charge of the butcher shop during their absence.



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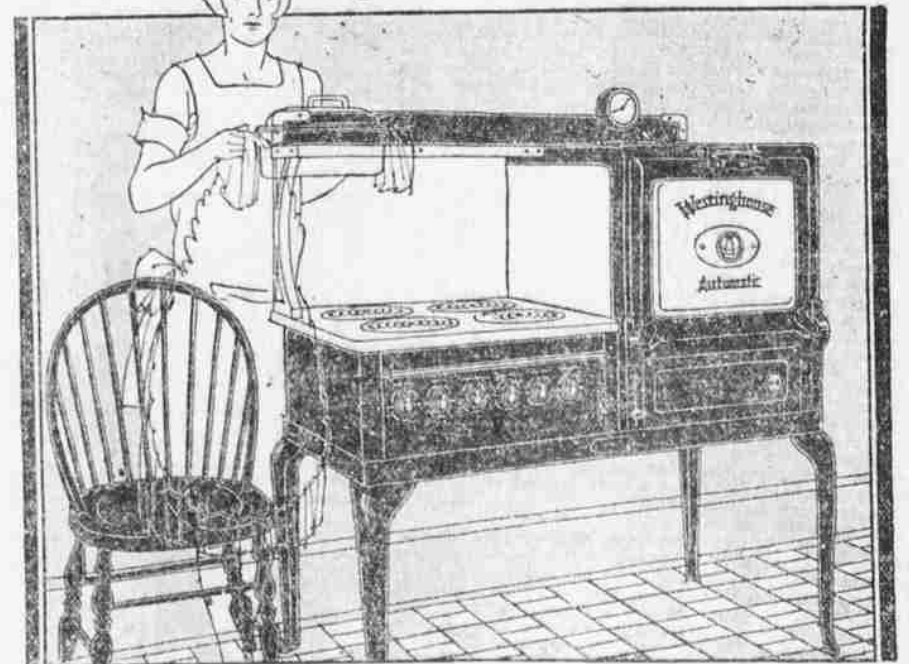
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
