Miss Sims reviewed Harry Emerson Fosdick's book, "The Twenty-Fruits of a Good Character," which was followed by a general discussion.

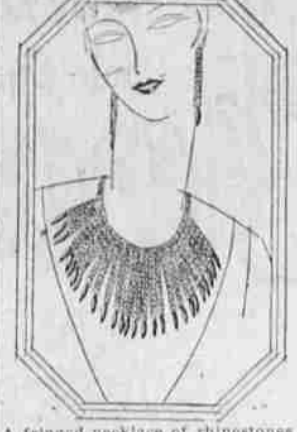
Fourteen girls of the class were present. Refreshments were served and a sociable evening followed a brief business session.

## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
**BREAKFAST**—Chilled orange juice, cereal cooked with dates, cream, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Consomme, toasted crackers, stuffed onion salad, whole wheat rolls, sliced peaches, layer cake, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Roast beef, browned potatoes, ten-minute cabbage, head lettuce with Russian dressing, chilled watermelon, milk, coffee.

**Stuffed Onion Salad**  
 Four large onions, 1/2 cup cooked green beans or any vegetable at hand, 2 tomatoes, hard-cooked egg, mayonnaise, water cross.

Peel onions and cook in boiling slightly salted water until tender but not soft or broken. Cool and remove centers to form shells.

Chop centers with beans and one tomato. Bind with mayonnaise. Fill onion shells with mixture. Peel remaining tomato and cut in four slices. Place each slice on a bed of water cross. On each slice of tomato put a stuffed onion. Mask with mayonnaise and top with a slice of hard-cooked egg.

Cooked carrots, peas, lima beans or dried cold boiled potato can be used in place of green beans if convenient.
