Liner Collides With Steamer in Atlantic; 1 Dead
NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—The Holland American line announced today the receipt of a wireless from the captain of the company's liner Veendam stating the Veendam collided with and sank the Norwegian steamer Sagaland four miles east of Nantucket tonight at 1:46 a. m. today. All aboard the Sagaland were saved except one, the message said. The Veendam was undamaged and was bound for New York. The Veendam, out of Rotterdam July 5 and Southampton July 6, is due at quarantine, New York, at 7 o'clock tonight. On board are the Sagaland survivors. The Sagaland left Mantsanillo, Cuba, July 7 for Boston. The ship was 2,667 tons gross register and was built in 1921. The Sagaland, a freighter, owned by Norway, is believed to have carried 80 passengers. Its crew is said to number around 25.

Wilhelmina Nearest
Of the three ships which went to her aid, the steamer Wilhelmina, presumably was the nearest—about 250 miles from the position reported in the first distress call. The army transport Kenovis and the liner President Pierce, both in the general vicinity, responded to the call. An army message timed 6:36 a. m. Pacific time, confirmed the report that the monoplane had only a four-hour gas supply and announced that the steamer Wilhelmina would continue moving to its rescue. The Wilhelmina, at 6:46 relayed the following message: "About 500 miles northeast of Pala. Rush help!" At 2:45 the Radio Corporation of America intercepted a message from the aviators, saying: "We are going to land in the sea. We have a rubber lifeboat but need help." Still in Air That the plane still was in the air when its last radio report was heard was indicated when it became known that the wireless was not able to operate after landing. Officials at Pearl Harbor announced the navy was standing by but that its hands were tied because no airplanes were available that could make such a trip and return. They pointed out that at least four ships, presumably the Wilhelmina, the liner President Pierce, the army transport Kenovis and the steamer Calawall, could reach the city of Oakland more quickly and effectively than sea planes.

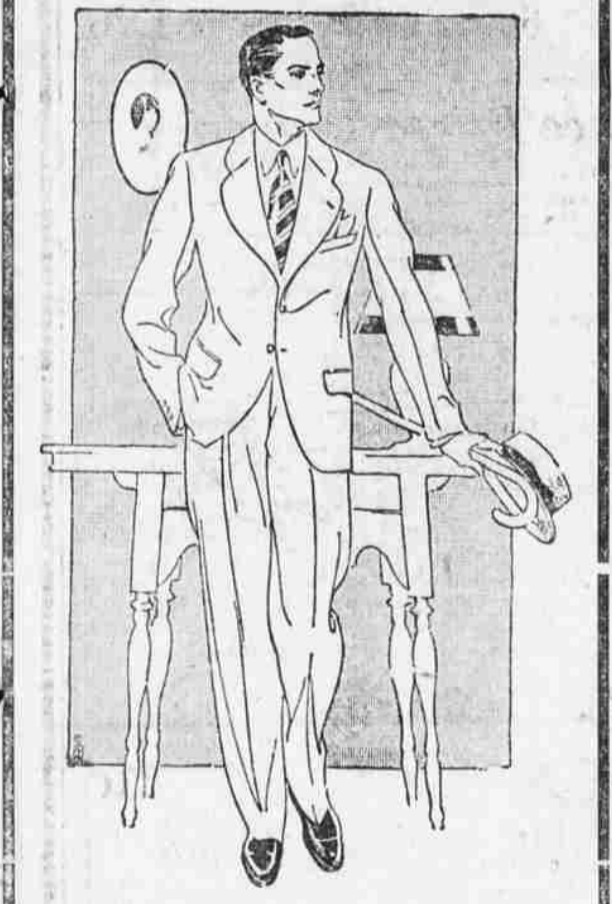
